

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# PRESIDENT'S PAGE

Yesterday (17 April 1988), I was where many birders would like to be – on the Fort Pierre National Grasslands before dawn along with meadowlarks, Homed Larks, Mallards, Sandhill Cranes, dancing Sharp-tailed Grouse, and booming Greater Prairie-Chickens. As the sun rose above the horizon and the sounds found the sights, my thoughts took me to why it takes so long for me to write the SDOU President's Page. 1'd rather be birding. Then I saw an unfamiliar sparrow-sized bird walking over



Buffalo Grass. The bird flew from sight and I was unable to identify it. Was it a longspur, pipit, or sparrow? This bird brought my attention to a topic that has occupied birders for many years: rare-bird sightings.

The primary purpose of the SDOU is to promote the study of birds — Ornithology. As a science, the techniques of our observations and conclusions that we draw should provide reliable information about South Dakota birds. If we are to become proficient identifying birds, we should become knowledgeable about the common birds of the state by referring to SDOU's checklist, The Birds of South Dakota, and other good field guides. If we find an extraordinary species within South Dakota, we should then document and submit our sightings to other birders who can scrutinize our record. The rare-bird sighting documentation form, as presented in this issue of *Bird Notes*, lists the information that should be recorded when a rare bird is sighted. The rare bird records committee reviews this data and assigns the sighting as confirmed, questionable, or not confirmed, according to the information presented. This committee's efforts are commendable and should be applauded and welcomed as a means to heighten our credibility as accurate birders. As serious birders, we must use this format and provide this material so that rare sightings can become dependable records. In my opinion, the techniques used to identify birds by observation are adequate and reliable if used correctly. However, the way we sometimes rush into an identification may cause problems. The information required to attempt a verification of a bird identification should not deter birders from reporting rare birds, but rather should add confidence to our birding abilities and improve the accuracy of our identifications.

American Woodcock: Scolopax minor

Heritage status: Rare.

Breeding season review: SD nests with eggs observed 21 April to 16 June, with young 28 April to 20 June.

Breeding records: 21 May 1967, Clay Co., nest with 3 eggs (Whitney et al. 1978); 27 April 1972, Brookings Co., nest with 4 eggs (Gates 1973); 26 May 1977, Marshall Co., Sica Hollow, adult with 2 young (Collignon 1978); 20 June 1985, Waubay NWR, Day Co., adult with 5 young (Rabenberg et al. in Seasons 1985d).

Breeding seasons and records adj. states: MN: 18 April 1984, Pipestone Co., nest with 4 eggs (Snyder 1985) and nesting, Big Stone Co. (Janssen and Simonson 1984a). Egg dates 21 April to 23 June (Johnsgard 1979). IA:

nesting season 21 March to 20 June, nests with eggs 4 May to 31 May, with young seen 18 April - 1 June (Dinsmore et al. 1980).

California Gull: Larus californicus

Heritage status: Rare

Breeding season review: SD nesting season, egg dates 27 May - 3 July, young observed in nests 6 June - 3 July.

Breeding records: 3 July 1981, South Waubay Lake, Day Co., 3 nests with eggs and young (Harris 1982); 5 June 1986, Piyas Lake, Marshall Co., 2 nests with eggs (Skadsen 1987c); 15 June 1986, Bitter Lake, Day Co., 7 nests with eggs and young (Skadsen 1987c).

Breeding seasons and records adj. states: ND: breeding season early may to early August, nests with eggs observed 3 May to 24 June with flightless young seen 8 June to 28 July (Stewart 1975).

Common Tem: Sterna hirando

Heritage status: Rare

Breeding season review: SD nesting season, nests with eggs observed 28 May - 9 July, young in nests from 13 June - 9 July, nonflying young 3 August.

Breeding records: 22 June 1969, North Drywood Lake, Roberts Co., 36 nests with eggs and young (Harris 1970b); 22 June 1984, Piyas Lake, Marshall Co., 7 nests (Husmann and Rabenberg in seasons 1984d); 14 June 1986, North Waubay Lake, Day Co., 10 nests with eggs (Skadsen 1987c).

Breeding seasons and records adj. states: ND: breeding season late May to mid-August, nests with eggs observed 8 June to 28 July with young seen in nests 22 June to 31 July (Stewart 1975).

Least Tern: Sterna antillarum athalassos

Heritage status: Critically rare

Official designation: Federal endangered. State endangered.

Breeding season review: SD egg dates 20 May - 17 August, downy and feathered young seen in nests 25 June - 11

August (Schwalbach pers. comm.).

Breeding records: 1 July 1968, Missouri River, Clay Co., nests with eggs and young, 2 July 1968, Missouri River, Union Co., nest with eggs and young; 10 July 1968, Missouri River, Buffalo Co., 3 nests (Harris 1968a); 1984, Oahe Dam, Stanley Co., 4 nests later flooded (Coonrod and Riis in Seasons 1984d); 1986, Missouri River, Bon Homme, Clay, Charles Mix, Sully, and Yankton counties, Cheyenne River, Haakon, Meade, and Pennington counties, nests with eggs and young (Schwalbach pers. comm.).

Breeding seasons and records adj. states: ND: egg dates 2 July - 21 July (Stewart 1975). 1A: nesting season last week of July through August (Dinsmore et al. 1980). NE: 1986 Missouri River, Cedar, Dixon, and Knox counties, nests with young and eggs (dates included in SD season review) (Schwalbach et al. 1986); 1984 Boyd and Keya Paha counties, nesting (Bennett 1985).

Common Barn-Owl: Tyto alba

Heritage status: Rare

Breeding season review: SD nesting season probably April through September (Whitney et al. 1978). Nest with young observed 10 June - 17 September.

Breeding records: July 1981, Missouri River mile 944, Brule Co., adult with young in bluff cavity (Freidel 1981); 1972, Fall River Co. (Adolphson 1973); June 1984, Missouri River, Hughes Co., nest destroyed by waves (Riis, pers. comm.); 26 July 1987, Jackson Co., nest with young (Graupmann in Seasons 1987d).

Breeding seasons and records adj. states: NE: 1978, Dawes Co. (Bennett 1980); 1984, Sioux Co. (Bennett 1985). IA: species listed as state endangered (Roosa 1977); 19 July, nest with young (Dinsmore et al. 1980). MN: 14 July and 10 September, eggs and young observed in nests (Johnson 1982).

## Long-eared Owl: Asio ous

Heritage status: Rare.

Breeding season review: SD nesting season: April through June (Whitney et al. 1978). Egg dates: 26 April - 28 May, nestlings observed 29 April - 4 July.

Breeding records: 5 May 1968, Sanborn Co., nest with I egg and 14 May 1969, Roberts Co., Sodak Park, nest with 6 eggs (Harris 1971b); 29 April 1970, Brookings Co., nest with 4 nestlings (Harr 1971); 30 May 1975, Marshall Co.,

Sica Hollow, nest with 2 young (Harris in Seasons 1975c); 1976, Bennett Co., nesting (Lohoefener and Ely 1978); 1972, Perkins Co., nest with 3 eggs (Hinds in Seasons 1972c); 4 April 1982, Pervington Co., Badlands NP, nest (Paulson and Sieg 1984); June 1983, Meade Co., adult with 1 young (Tallman et al. 1983); 1983, Fall River Co., nest (Peterson in Seasons 1983d); May 1983, Slim Buttes, Harding Co., nest with young (Hodorff and Sieg pers. comm).

Breeding seasons and records adj. states: NE: 1982, Cherry Co., nesting (Bennett 1983). ND: nesting season late April - mid-August, egg dates 28 April to 16 June, nestlings observed 20 May - 15 July, dependent young 21 June - 17 August (Stewart 1975).

Northern Saw-whet Owl: Aegolius acadious

Heritage status: Undetermined.

Breeding season review: SD: immatures seen 29 May - 12 July.

Breeding records: 12 July 1972, Pennington Co., immature (Whitney in Seasons 1972c); 29 May 1978, Roberts Co., Big Stone Lake, fledged young (Spinner and Spinner1978); June 1983, Meade Co., 1 inmature (Tallman et al. 1983).

Breeding seasons and records adj. states: MN: egg dates from 12 April - 22 May with young observed 7 April - 13 July (Johnson 1982).

Common Poorwill: Phalaenoptilus nuttallii

Heritage status: Rare

Breeding season review and record: Only confirmed SD record: 28 June 1985, Harding Co., nest with 2 young (Springer in Seasons 1985d).

Breeding seasons and records adj. states: NE: 1976, Dawes Co. (Bennett 1977). CO: nesting season extends from May - July (Terres 1980).

Whip-poor-will: Caprinulgus vociferus

Heritage status: Rare.

Breeding season review: Not confirmed as breeding in SD, although breeding season records along eastern edge of

state and along Missouri River in SE SD suggest breeding.

Breeding seasons and records adj. states: IA: nest with eggs 25 June hatched by 16 July (Dinsmore et al. 1980). MN: young reported 26 July (Wilson 1985).

Three-toed Woodpecker: Picoides tridactylus

Heritage status: Rare.

Breeding season review: SD nesting season May - July, nest with eggs observed 12 June (Whitney et al. 1978). Nests with young seen 19 June - 9 August.

Breeding records: 19 June 1965, Cheyenne Crossing, Lawrence Co., nest with young (Whitney et al. 1978); 20 - 22 June 1984, Sylvan Lake, Custer Co., adults feeding young in cavity (Whitney in Seasons 1984d).

### Pilezted Woodpecker Dryocopus pileatus

Heritage status: Status undetermined.

Breeding season review: No definite breeding records for SD. Recent sightings suggest possible breeding in NE SD (Harris 1987).

Breeding seasons and records adj. states: MN: 1985 Lac Qui Parle State Park, Lac Qui Parle Co., nesting (Wilson and Shedd 1986), eggs observed 9 May - 23 May (Johnsgard 1979). ND: probable nesting season May - md-July (Stewart 1975).

Olivesided Aycatcher: Contopus borealis

Heritage status: Status undetermined

Breeding season review: Little data available, a possible breeder in the Black Hills (Whitney et al. 1978). Nesting Season May - July (Terres 1980).

Comments: Breeding season observations 27 June 1985, Custer Co. (Whitney in Seasons 1985d); 2 July 1967 and 29 June 1969, Black Fox Camp ground, Lawrence Co. and prior to 1965 in Pennington Co. (Whitney et al. 1978).

Clark's Nutcracker: Nucifraga columbiana

Heritage status: Status undetermined.

Breeding season review and records: Few data available, uncommon visitor in the Black Hills (Whitney et al. 1978). Breeding records: 29 April 1985, Pass Creek and Plum Canyon, Custer Co., adults feeding fledged young (Peterson 1985); 7-15 April 1987, Custer Co., 3 nests with 2 young each (Peterson in Seasons 1987d). Nesting usually March - May (Terres 1980).

Tufted Titmouse: Parus bicolor

Heritage status: Status undetermined.

Breeding season review: In SD considered a casual summer resident in Union Co. (Whitney et al. 1978), but no recent breeding season records or observations.

Breeding seasons and records adj. states: IA: early May - July (Diosmore et al. 1980).

Pygmy Nuthatch: Sitta pygmaea

Heritage status: Critically rare.

Breeding season review and records: Few data available for SD, where a rare to uncommon resident in the Black Hills, including a breeding record prior to 1965 in Pennington Co. (Whitney et al. 1978). 12 July 1968, Custer Co., 2 adults with 8 fledged young (Weaver 1982); adult constructing nest cavity 24 March 1983, Shep's Canyon, Fall River Co., with adults feeding both young in and out of this nest 29 May (Peterson 1983). Nesting April - June (Terres 1980). Breeding seasons and records adj. states: NE: 29 June 1970, Sioux Co., adults carrying food to cavity (Rosche 1972).

American Dipper: Cinclus mexicanus

Heritage status: Uncommon

Breeding season review: SD nesting season late April - July (Whitney et al. 1978), nests with eggs observed 14 June and 5 July, fledged young observed 13 June.

Breeding records: 14 June 1979, Spearfish Canyon, Lawrence Co., nest with 4 eggs (Bjerke in Seasons 1979d). Nesting record prior to 1965 in Pennington Co. (Whitney 1955).

Blue-gray Gnatcatcher: Polioptila coerdo

Heritage status: Critically rare, peripheral

Breeding season review and record: Little data available for SD. A rare summer resident in SE SD (Whitney et al. 1978), except Newton Hills SP, Lincoln Co., where observed for 7 consecutive years, 1981-1987 (Springer and Skadsen 1986, Springer in Seasons 1987c and d). Only breeding evidence: pair building nest 4 May 1986, Newton Hills SP, later abandoned (Skadsen 1987).

Breeding seasons and records adj. states: MN: 1981, nesting, Blue Mounds State Park, Rock Co. (Eckert 1981).

#### Eastern Bluebird: Sialia sialis

Heritage status: Rare.

Breeding season review: Nesting on Waubay NWR nest trail, Day Co. late April -mid-July, eggs dates 15 May - 12 July, young in nest 15 May - 19 July (Skadsen 1987a).

Breeding records: 10 June 1966, Sodak Park, Roberts Co., female carrying food to nest hole; 25 June 1968, James River, Sanborn Co., adults feeding young (Whitney et al. 1978); 12 June 1968, Harding Co., nesting (Baylor and Rosine 1970); 1971, Perkins Co., nesting (Hinds in Seasons 1971d), 1976, Clay Co., nesting (Seasons 1976d); 11 June 1977, Pennington Co., nest failed due to predation (Knecht in Seasons 1977d); 1979, Hutchinson Co., nesting (Spomer in Seasons 1979d), June and July 1981, Yankton Co., juveniles (Hall in Seasons 1981d); 1982, Deuel Co. nesting (Stava in Seasons 1982d); 1983 Brookings, Jackson, Meade, and Hyde counties, breeding (Seasons 1983d); July 1984, Waubay NWR, Day Co., 6 nests (Husmann in Seasons 1984d); 21 May 1987, Union Co., adults feeding young in cavity (Springer in Seasons 1987d); 1987, Gregory Co., 4 pair nesting (Steffen in Seasons 1987d); 1987, Custer Co., successfully nested (Unpublished seasons report 1987).

Breeding seasons and records adj. states: MN: Eggs observed 16 April - 16 August (Rustad 1972); 1977 Big Stone NWR, Lac Qui Parle Co., nesting (Buer 1981); Rock Co., nesting (Janssen and Simonson 1984b); 1986, nesting Big Stone Co. (Shedd and Wilson 1987). NE: 1985, Dawes Co., nesting (Faanes 1985). ND: breeding Season late April - early September, eggs in nests 3 June - 22 July (Stewart 1975).

Vecry: Cathorus fuscescens

Heritage status: Rwe

Breeding season review: SD nesting season June - July, nest with eggs observed 15 June, nest with young 17 June,

Sica Hollow State Park, Roberts

and Marshall counties (Whitney et al. 1978).

Breeding records: 1983, Knights Canyon, Marshall and Roberts counties, nesting (Harris in Seasons 1983d).

Breeding seasons and records adj. states: ND: breeding season probably late May - late July, nexts with eggs 6 June - 15 June (Stewart 1975). MN: egg dates, 24 May - 10 July, with nextlings observed 11 June (Johnsgard 1979).

Wood Thrush: Hylocichla mustelina

Heritage status: Status undetermined.

Breeding season review: SD nesting season, June. Nests with eggs seen 7, 23 June, nest with young 10 June and 23 June.

Breeding records: 23 June 1968, Sodak Park, Roberts Co., nest with 1 young (Harris in Seasons 1978d); 7 June 1969, Charles Mix Co., nest with 4 eggs (Harris 1969), 1-6 June 1972, Missouri River, Gregory Co., 5 active nests (Anderson in Seasons 1972c), 26 May 1985, Newton Hills State Park, Lincoln Co., nest (Buckman and Anderson pers. comm.).

Breeding seasons and records adj. states: ND: 28 July 1976 Richland Co. (Lambeth and Lambeth 1979).

Northern Mockingbird Mimus polyglottos

Heritage status: status undetermined.

Breeding season review and records: SD nest with young 22 June and nests with eggs seen 24 June, Sanborn Co. (Harris 1968b), 13 July 1978, Bon Homme Co., adult and immature (Wilcox in Seasons 1978d). Nesting records prior to 1965 in Clay, Davison, Sanborn, and Fall River counties.

Breeding seasons and records adj. states: MN: nest with young 6 August 1977, Blue Mounds State Park, Rock Co. (Eckert 1977). ND: 8 June and 9 July 1980, nests with young, 27 June, nest with eggs, Dickey Co. (Child et al. 1980).

Sage Thrasher Oreoscoptes montanus

Heritage status: Critically rare.

Breeding season review and records: Few data available with no definite breeding records, considered a rare summer resident in SW SD (Whitney et al. 1978). Eggs usually laid April - July (Terres 1980).

Sprague's Pipit: Anthus spragueü

Heritage status: Status undetermined.

Breeding season review: Breeding species in Harding, Dewey, and Stanley counties and possibly in Corson, Campbell, and McPherson counties (Whitney et al. 1978). No recent nesting records for SD.

Breeding seasons and records adj. states: ND: breeding season late April - early September, nests with eggs 7 June - 4 July, nest with young 2 August (Stewart 1975), 20 May 1981, McIntosh Co., nest with eggs (Berkey 1987). Species listed as endangered in MN (1984 Minnesota Official List of Endangered, Threatened and Special Concern Plants and Animals).

Yellow-throated Vireo: Vireo flavifrons

Heritage status: Rare.

Breeding season review: SD nesting season last week of May - June (Whitney et al. 1978). Breeding records prior to 1965 in southeastern SD.

Breeding records: 1983, Enemy Swim Lake, Day Co., nesting (Harris and Husmann in Seasons 1983d).

Breeding seasons and records adj. states: ND: breeding season late May - August with active nests seen 8 June - 8 July, dependent young observed 4 August (Stewart 1975); 20 June 1979, Sargent Co., nest with 6 young (Berkey 1987).

Black-and-White Warbler, Mniotilta varia

Heritage status: Status undetermined.

Breeding season review and record: SD nesting season June - July (Whitney et al. 1978). Only breeding evidence: adults with young seen 5 July 1981, Dark Canyon, Pennington Co. (Baker in Seasons 1981d).

Comments: Breeding record prior to 1965 in Todd Co. (Whitney et al. 1978). Probably nests in 5 or 6 areas of SD

Sage Thrasher Oreoscoptes montanus

Heritage status: Critically rare.

Breeding season review and records: Few data available with no definite breeding records, considered a rare summer resident in SW SD (Whitney et al. 1978). Eggs usually laid April - July (Tetres 1980).

Sprague's Pipit: Anthus spragueä

Heritage status: Status undetermined.

Breeding season review: Breeding species in Harding, Dewey, and Stanley counties and possibly in Corson, Campbell, and McPherson counties (Whitney et al. 1978). No recent nesting records for SD.

Breeding seasons and records adj. states: ND: breeding season late April - early September, nests with eggs 7 June - 4 July, nest with young 2 August (Stewart 1975), 20 May 1981, McIntosh Co., nest with eggs (Berkey 1987). Species listed as endangered in MN (1984 Minnesota Official List of Endangered, Threatened and Special Concern Plants and Animals).

Yellow-throated Vireo: Vireo flavifrons

Heritage status: Rare.

Breeding season review: SD nesting season last week of May - June (Whitney et al. 1978). Breeding records prior to 1965 in southeastern SD.

Breeding records: 1983, Enemy Swim Lake, Day Co., nesting (Harris and Husmann in Seasons 1983d).

Breeding seasons and records adj. states: ND: breeding season late May - August with active nests seen 8 June - 8 July, dependent young observed 4 August (Stewart 1975); 20 June 1979, Sargent Co., nest with 6 young (Berkey 1987).

Black-and-White Warblet: Mniotilta varia

Heritage status: Status undetermined.

Breeding season review and record: SD nesting season June - July (Whitney et al. 1978). Only breeding evidence: adults with young seen 5 July 1981, Dark Canyon, Pennington Co. (Baker in Seasons 1981d).

Comments: Breeding record prior to 1965 in Todd Co. (Whitney et al. 1978). Probably nests in 5 or 6 areas of SD

Threatened and Special Concern Plants and Animals).

Henslow's Sparrow: Ammodramus henslowii

Heritage status: Status undetermined.

Breeding season review: SD nesting season probably late May - July (Whitney et al. 1978).

Comments: Species not confirmed as breeding in state, but reported breeding prior to 1965 in Minnehaha and Bon Homme counties. Species of special concern in MN (1984 Minnesota Official List of Endangered, Tureatened and Special Concern Plants and Animals).

Le Conte's Sparrow: Ammodramus leconteii

Heritage status: Status undetermined.

Breeding season review: SD nesting season probably June - July, nest with eggs 19 June and nest observed 25 June (Whitney et al. 1978).

Breeding records: 5 August 1986, Day Co., adult feeding fledged young (Skadsen 1987b).

Breeding seasons and records adj. states: ND: probably breeding season mid-May - early September, egg dates 27 May - 19 June, dependent young observed 1 August (Stewart 1975).

Sharp-tailed Sparrow Ammodramus condocutus

Heritage status: Status undetermined.

Breeding season review: SD nesting season probably June, but nesting unconfirmed in state (Whitney et al. 1978).

Breeding seasons and records adj. states: ND: breeding season early June - late August, egg dates 12 June - 12

July, nest with young observed 25 July (Stewart 1975). MN: Species of special concern (1984 Minnesota Official List

of Endangered, Threatened and Special Concern Plants and Animals).

McCown's Longspur: Calcarius mccownii

Heritage status: Status undetermined.

Breeding season review and record: SD nesting season May - July, only record: nest with young 16 July 1910

(Whitney et al. 1978).

Breeding seasons and records adj. states: ND: species listed as "state threatened" (McKenna and Seabloom 1979), breeding season mid-May - early August, egg dates 17 May - 22 July (Stewart 1975), 25 May 1970, Bowman Co., nest with eggs (Whitney et al. 1978). NE: nest with eggs observed 9 June 1985, Sioux Co. (Bray 1985b).

Cassin's Finch: Corpodacus caesinii

Heritage status: Status undetermined.

Breeding season review and record: SD possibly a rare summer resident in the Black Hills (Whitney et al. 1978). Only evidence of breeding: 10 and 11 July 1984, young begging for food, Custer Co. (Peterson in Seasons 1984d).

Breeding seasons and records adj. states: NE: 25 July 1980, female feeding 2 young incapable of sustained flight, Chadron State Park (Rosche 1982). WY: 17 July 1905, nest with eggs Crook Co. (Pettingill and Whitney

Red Crossbill: Loxia curvirostra


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
Heritage status: Uncommon.


Breeding season review: SD nesting season January - July in Black Hills, East river nesting, female building nest 25 March, same nest contained 2 eggs 29 March in Yankton (Whitney et al. 1978); pair gathering nest material late March; adults observed feeding immatures 20 April - 16 June.

Breeding records: 20 January 1965, Sheridan Lake, Pennington Co., female building nest (Whitney et al. 1978); 1 June 1969, Todd Co., adult feeding young (Whitney et al. 1978); 22 April 1980, Codington Co., pair feeding young (Herring 1981); 24 March 1987, Pickerel Lake Rec. Area, Day Co., nest with 3 young (Skadsen in Seasons 1987c).

Breeding seasons and records adj. states: NE: 24 March 1974, nest with eggs, young observed in nest 5 April, 1981 nesting June - July (Rosche 1982).







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# GENERAL NOTES

WEST RIVER OLDSQUAWS. On the afternoon of 14 November 1987, I observed a basic-plumaged male Oldsquaw at Bear Butte Lake, near Sturgis, Meade Co., South Dakota. I easily identified the bird by its distinctive plumage. Calm waters and good light aided my conclusion.

According to The Birds of South Dakota (Whitney et al.), the Oldsquaw's status in the state is casual. With the exception of occurrences at LaCreek NWR, all records are from the Missouri River and east. Thus, my observation appears to be a first western record outside LaCreek. One record for NW Nebraska exists; two Oldsquaw were seen by Dorothy and Richard Rosche at Lakeside, approximately 100 miles SE of Bear Butte, on 11 November 1979. # **BOOK REVIEWS**

New Generation Guide to the Birds of Britain and Europe by Christopher Perrins. University of Texas Press: Austin. Hardbound. 320 pp.

Why would a South Dakotan buy a field guide to the birds of Europe? Naturally you would buy the book if you planned a European vacation. Perhaps you could anticipate seeing a European waif blown onto our shores. Or, like some of us, you might be just an incurable book collector.

This guide is quite distinctive. In fact, it is two books in one: a field guide and an introductory ornithology course. The book is not the best guide to European birds. While the paintings are well executed and do portray males, females and immatures, the illustrations appear inordinately small. For example, one plate contains 38 buntings while 36 gulls grace another page. Subtle points of identification must certainly be lost with this layout. Therefore, the traveler probably would be wise to look for another field guide.

But the field guide comprises less than half this text: the remainder is devoted to bird biology that is fascinating on any continent. The only drawback to this presentation is that the examples are, naturally, of European birds (although, of course, our birds are built and behave in similar fashions). A wealth of information is presented in this field guide-sized text: the evolution, anatomy, nomenclature, behavior, and ecology of birds are all covered with short text and many color illustrations. # THE 1987-88 WINTER SEASON

by DENNIS SKADSEN, BOX 113, GRENVILLE, SD 57239

The season was marked by one of the worst winters on record. Many records for low temperatures were broken in late January and February and, on several occasions, South Dakota provided the national low temperature. Several

major snowstorms hit the southeastern and southcentral pasts of the state in January and February. Sioux Falls had a total of 45 inches of snow by February. In Yankton, one storm delivered 17 inches of snow. Deuel Co. had 35 inches of snow, with many of these storms accompanied by 35 to 50 mph winds. Northeastern SD, on the other hand, received below normal precipitation.

Despite the weather, many species wintered in the state. Species attempting to winter included Killdeer, snipe, Mourning Dove, Red-headed Woodpecker and Yellow-bellied Sapsucker. Unusual sightings included Oldsquaw, Gyrfalcon, and Barred Owl.
