

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

# President's Page

In last December's President's Page I mistakenly reported that Nat Whitney had financed the first Bird Notes color photo when, in fact, the sponsors were Les and Mary Baylor. My apologies to Les and Mary; such lapses in memory seem more common for me as I age.

Risking further memory failures, I look back at SDOU during my first 27 years as a member. Curiously, our membership numbers have remained fairly steady, albeit with different individuals over the years. This strength is a good thing; much better than a fading organization. On the other hand, birding is said to be one of the fastest growing hobbies in the nation. Certainly we might expect a parallel growth in SDOU



membership. I have always felt that, if each of us signed up only one new member, our ranks would double! The robust sales of The Birds of South Dakota indicate that grassroots interest in state birding exists.

Why don't people join SDOU? Some are intimidated by what they perceive as their relative lack of birding skills. This perception, of course, is unfortunate, since there is no better way to become a competent birder than to go out with other birders. SDOU meetings can be intimidating for the novice birder. Some of our better birders, for various reasons, go off birding on their own, leaving the newcomers feeling slighted. This has always been the case in our bird meetings. Perhaps many of our better birders seldom have the opportunity to bird with their colleagues except at SDOU meetings. Beginners easily feel slighted if their identifications are doubted or if their birding techniques are criticized. I usually introduce people to the SDOU by explaining that we are an esoteric, and often cantankerous, collection of birders of all abilities, despite the pretentious sound of our title, the South Dakota Ornithologists' Union. I also advise newcomers not to be shy, to introduce themselves, and to enjoy the fellowship. I was impressed at the recent Belle Fourche meeting by Vic Fondy and Addison Ball's efforts to make new birders feel welcome by joining them at meals and inviting them to share rides during the field trips.

It is my opinion that the SDOU currently is stronger and more vibrant than during any time I can recall. The quality of our publications is excellent, as is the content of our fall paper sessions. Along with a healthy cadre of independent and nonprofessional birders, we have strong ties with the university ornithological community as well as with the South Dakota Department of Game, Fish and Parks. The SDOU listserv has transformed us into efficient communicators. (In an earlier era, telephone calling trees seldom made it around the state.) The various Internet photo galleries maintained by individual SDOU members are not only aesthetically inspiring, but also have transformed rare bird reporting.

Don't be shy in promoting this fine organization. If you do not feel like you have the time or the energy to participate in the committees or governance of SDOU, a great way to



contribute is to offer SDOU membership to birders you know around the state. If there are aspects of the SDOU that irritate you, make your feelings known. Only in this way will our group continue to better meet the needs of South Dakota birders.

# In Memoriam: Everett Montgomery 1913-2006

Everett Montgomery, a long-time SDOU member and former vice-president of the organization, died on 9 May 2006, after many years of failing health. Everett was a modest soul and a passionate birder. He never boasted about his abilities nor faulted others for their errors. He was so modest, in fact, that he did not feel capable of ascending to the SDOU presidency, as do most of our vice-presidents.

One reason for this modesty was his depression-era upbringing. Everett was born in Onawa, Iowa, on 5 February 1913. After graduating from high school, it fell upon Everett to support his siblings. He married Marjorie Keegan in December 1939, and moved to South Dakota when she became ill. He established a contracting company, Montgomery Decorating Services, and specialized in painting churches. Traveling with Everett could be quite interesting, as, due to garrulous parish priests, Everett was privy to the gossip of many South Dakota towns.

Marjorie died in 1970 and Everett was fortunate to marry Jeanette Dalton in January 1974. Jeanette oversaw Everett's business affairs and, because of her work, Everett was able to retire in the late 1970s and devote his time to birding and traveling.

Everett was the second South Dakota birder I ever met. The first was Byron Harrell of USD, whom I met at a Wilson Ornithological Society meeting in Omaha, Nebraska. After the meeting, I interviewed at Northern State University. Byron clairvoyantly knew my job application would be successful and alerted Everett to expect a young ornithologist in Aberdeen. The first weekend Erika and I were in town, Everett took us out to Mina Lake State Recreation Area and showed us a Long-eared Owl roost. I was reassured about my decision to come to South Dakota.

Over the next years, Everett and I birded throughout the state. Everett introduced me to many South Dakota birding hotspots. Often Everett gave Erika a break from child rearing when he packed me and toddler David into his pickup truck for an afternoon of birding. These jaunts resulted in a plethora of adventures and fond memories.

Early in our friendship, Everett and I drove to an AOU meeting in Boulder, Colorado. It was there that I became aware of Everett's modesty concerning his education. I tried to assure him that he was more competent than most of the AOU attendees, especially when it came to bird identification. But Everett was intimidated by all the famous ornithologists we met, although he enjoyed the field trips into the Rocky Mountains.

Once, after driving Everett to the Mayo Clinic where he required a small surgery, I squeaked up a Barred Owl. Everett seemed so impressed by my ability to attract birds in this fashion that I decided not to admit to dumb luck. During that trip, Everett introduced me to peppermint schnapps. He was not averse to a small drink before dinner, and this became somewhat of a ritual for us after a hard day's birding during many an SDOU meeting. I was also impressed by Everett's religious devotion, which led him to local

churches, even during SDOU weekends.

During the last years of his life, I did not take very good care of our friendship. Everett and Jeanette moved from their beautiful home to an assisted living apartment. As his health failed, Everett was heartbroken to have to curtail his annual winter Texas birding trips. We saw less and less of the Montgomery's and then he was gone.

Everett's funeral was beautiful. The service was entitled, "On Eagle's Wings." When Debi Dusseault, a professionally trained opera singer and church cantor, sang that same hymn at the end of the service, both Erika and I wept, for we knew there upon an eagle, Everett was certainly soaring.

## 2005 Report Of The Rare Bird Records Committee

The SDOU Rare Bird Records Committee (RBRC) met on 22 May 2005 at Vermillion and on 2 October 2005 at Brookings. The members of the committee were David Swanson (secretary), Ricky Olson, Todd Jensen, J. David Williams, and Jeffrey Palmer. All members either attended each meeting or voted in absentia.

Springer (1988. SDBN 40:67-70) outlined the purpose and voting procedures of the RBRC. The RBRC strongly encourages observers of rare or unusual birds in South Dakota to report their observations to the secretary of the RBRC (David Swanson of Vermillion, SD), preferably via email at David.Swanson@usd.edu. A Rare Bird Observation Form is available in electronic format for this purpose at http://homepages. dsu.edu/palmerj/SDOU/rbrf.doc.

One of the most difficult problems faced by the RBRC is dealing with reports having incomplete details. Rejection of these reports results in the potential loss of important information on the status and distribution of birds in the state. However, for an accurate picture of the status and distribution of birds within South Dakota, it is imperative that only reports with absolutely conclusive identifications be included in the official state records. For this reason, reports should be as detailed as possible and should describe the entire bird, as well as vocalizations or behaviors exhibited by the bird at the time of observation. Notes on the observation for rare bird reports should be prepared during the observation or as soon afterward as possible, preferably prior to consulting a field guide. Complete descriptions are necessary to provide the committee with the greatest amount of information on which to judge their acceptance or rejection. A summary of the type of information desired by the RBRC in a rare bird report can be found in Swanson (2004. SDBN 56:88-95). In addition, the RBRC would welcome submission of copies of actual field notes taken at the time of observation along with the rare bird report.

A listing of review species, for which rare bird reports are requested, is provided on the latest version of the checklist of South Dakota birds (available from K.C. Jensen, Brookings, SD). Observers are asked to submit reports of any species that is rare or unusual at a particular time or at a particular location within the state. This information can be found in Tallman et al. (2002. Birds of South Dakota, 3rd edition, SDOU, Aberdeen, SD). In addition, reports are requested for observations listed in the "Species Requiring Acceptance by the Rare Bird Records Committee" section in the Seasonal Reports of South Dakota Bird Notes. Observers whose records are accepted (Classes 1 and 2) are encouraged to publish these records in South Dakota Bird Notes, so details of the observation can be communicated to a wider audience.

Following are the results of the committee's action since the last report in the December 2005 issue of South Dakota Bird Notes. The numbers included in parentheses along with some reports indicate the committee's vote. If no numbers are listed, the vote was unanimous (5-0) or 4-0 if a committee member submitted the report. The committee wishes to emphasize that a rating of Class 3 or 4 (non-accepted record) does not imply any personal criticism of the observer. Such a rating only means that the information provided in the report, in the opinion of the committee, did not conclusively eliminate other similar species.

CLASS 1 (Accepted - Specimen, photograph, or recording).

Calliope Hummingbird. 13 June 2004. One adult male at Sturgis, Meade Co. Randy Podoll. Videotaped. Casual migrant in the Black Hills.

CLASS 2H (Hypothetical – Satisfactory written description, but a single observer sight record which would constitute a first state record).

Black Vulture. 25-26 August 2005. One adult below Oahe Dam, Stanley Co. Ricky Olson. The report provided a convincing description of Black Vulture, but the bird was not photographed or seen by corroborating observers and would constitute a first state record. (3 Class 2H, 1 Class 3).

Purple Sandpiper. 2 May 2003. One adult in breeding plumage near Eureka, McPherson Co. This report was originally rated Class 3 by the committee in October of 2003, but the report was reconsidered after the submission of additional information and the solicitation of opinions from experts on Purple Sandpiper identification. Given this new information, the committee rated this report Class 2H (4 Class 2H, 1 Class 3) as it was a single observer sight record that would constitute a first state record.

CLASS 3 (Not accepted – Identification possibly correct but description not completely convincing).

King Rail. 14 May 2004. One calling bird at the wetland north of Davis-Hurley exit directly east of I-29, Lincoln Co. The bird called only twice, which the committee felt was insufficient evidence for conclusive identification since Virginia Rails may make similar calls.

Magnificent Hummingbird. 10 July 2005. One female at Custer Co. The committee felt that the details of the report were insufficient to conclusively eliminate Broad-tailed or Blue-throated hummingbirds.

Cassin's Vireo. July 2005. One adult and one juvenile at Custer State Park, Custer Co. Photographs did not conclusively eliminate Plumbeous Vireo.

CLASS 4 (Not accepted - Identification probably or certainly incorrect).

No reports were rated as class 4.

## Seasonal Reports

01 December 2005 to 28 February 2006 The 2005-06 Winter Season

The winter of 2005-06 was once again mild. December started with very cold temperatures, but January and February were very mild. The drought in the west continued. Of note is the winter seasonal report's "Expected But Not Reported" list. Not one species on the 2004-05's "Expected But Not Reported" list appears on this years list. Three species, Trumpeter Swan, Peregrine Falcon, and Northern Bobwhite, were removed from the list because they had not been reported for five years or more. All others were observed in this season indicating how regular most birds are in their patterns. Northern Bobwhite and Trumpeter Swan are likely in the state but have not been reported for five years. These two need to be looked for in winter. As always, Christmas Bird Counts are not included and are reported elsewhere in South Dakota Bird Notes.
