The science of observation is evident when reading about first records: documenting first sighting of species in the state. One can see the cumulative progression of the state species list and the resulting enrichment of possibilities in our state. The changing distribution of colonial waterbird colonies is also trackable. By reading these issues you notice that species such as King Rail previously nested in southeast South Dakota, but now, even a sighting requires a rare bird report. To me it's very interesting to track the changes in makeup and distribution of avian species of South Dakota.

OUR KILLDEER NEST WATCH

It all started on April 25, 2014. Our son came to our house in a newly developing area of Sioux Falls twice that day. On his second departure he commented that, "Those Killdeer in the front yard are making a huge fuss every time I come in or out." After he left, I looked out our guest room window at the front yard to see what the Killdeer were doing. I was surprised to see one squatting down in a small depression in our gravel-landscaped flower garden about eight feet from the window, and also eight feet from the front door.

The bird wiggled its tail a few times, called out a few times, then left. My husband Bill and I walked out and discovered an egg in the depression. But the Killdeer did not come back to incubate. The next day, I heard the Killdeer, watched them run around the front lawn, one doing distraction displays as walkers passed by on the sidewalk. Then, surprisingly, the female laid a second egg; then they both left again. On the third day a third egg appeared, but still no incubating. Finally, on April 29, one more egg was laid, and incubation started. The female was lighter gray-backed than the male, so I could tell when, usually in the evening, the male would replace the female on the nest at least for some time, though by morning the female was always on the nest again.

In those first few days, whenever someone came to our front door, both Killdeer would create a great noisy distraction display, so we began asking all visitors to enter and leave through the garage. We had read that Killdeer incubate for 25 to 28 days approximately, and I wanted to capture the hatching on video if possible, so I marked the days. When we left for the Spring SDOU meeting in Milbank on May 23, I feared that I would miss the whole thing while we were gone. When we got home on the late afternoon of May 25 we were greeted by a distraction display as we pulled the car into the driveway. I ran in to check the nest out the guestroom window and just before the female Killdeer nestled back down I saw downy feathers. I ran to get my camera and had the amazing experience of getting a video of all four chicks emerging and staggering around on wobbly legs for their first venture out of the nest. From the start of incubation, it was 26 days until hatching. For the next week we observed the parent Killdeer with their chicks every now and then in the field next to our house, or on our front or back lawn. The day after hatching, the chicks were gone from the nest, never to return. The parent Killdeer very aggressively chased off all birds in a wide area around the chicks as they ran around pecking at weeds and the ground and crouching down when hearing the parents' frequent alarm calls.

By May 28, the third day after leaving the nest, the family had moved farther away to a field around the corner. Every now and then for the next month I would see a young Killdeer, although they were nearly adult size by late June. Through June and July two more Killdeer families showed up in the fields beside our house, so we have watched at least ten Killdeer grow up and I think I can identify the specific call parent Killdeer use to keep track of their fledglings as they scatter across fields. The main things we learned from this wonderful experience were that ground nesting Killdeer lay much larger eggs than, say, tree nesting robins, and that Killdeer chicks, born larger and more mature than tree-nesting birds, are on the move almost immediately after hatching. We surmise that the purpose of the delayed incubation, five days after the first egg was laid, and only after the fourth egg was laid, is to accomplish hatching all at once.

Ground-nesting birds have safety issues that tree-nesters don't face, but our front-yard Killdeer proved that their method of nesting could succeed at producing a healthy foursome.

THIS LAND IS MY LAND, THIS LAND IS YOUR LAND...

When I first came to Blue Cloud Abbey in March of 2013 to meet with the monks about leasing their land, I traveled northbound on I-29 from Iowa to South Dakota. As I drove, the skies ahead darkened, not from weather, but from thousands upon thousands of migrating geese, gray masses of birds that churned like storm clouds. This was a harbinger for what would transpire—that I, myself, would soon migrate north, and that birds would become my leitmotif, apropos for a few years earlier when deciding a pen name I'd chosen: Trey *Wren*.

In April 2013, I moved into a small hermitage on the upper bank of the abbey's six-acre lower lake, my new backyard seven-hundred-and-fifty acres of native grassland. Besides the three monks that resided in the monastery, my neighbors were a diverse group of migrating waterfowl and melodic songbirds. By year-end I had fallen in love with the landscape and its inhabitants, and when given the opportunity that winter, I purchased the abbey's native range and hayfields.

I'm delighted when others share my enthusiasm for habitat and wildlife, love a flock that flocks together, so on Memorial weekend 2014, when South Dakota Ornithologists' Union members gathered in Milbank for their annual spring meeting, I welcomed participants here—*The Abbey Grasslands of the Prairie Coteau*—part of the Glacial Lakes and Prairie Region of northeast South Dakota. Thirty-three birders toured my grasslands sighting ninety-three species over the two days. On day one, the sightings luckily included a variety of warblers—Tennessee, Yellow, Chestnut-sided, Magnolia, Blackburnian, Blackpoll, and Yellow-rumped—for by the second day, they had already vanished, migrating farther north.

Birders amaze me as much as do birds. While meandering through a wooded timber beside a creek lined with cascades of polished rock, my fellow birders successfully navigated the terrain of felled logs and tree stumps while staring straight up. Amazingly, not one person ended up in the creek while scanning the tree canopy for flits and swoops, ears tuned to faint trills and loud chirps. Our group spotted vibrant Scarlet Tanagers that flashed tomato-red through spread branches, and spied a pair of Great Horned Owl nestlings that gawked from a nest in a tree fork, walnut-size eyes burrowed within down-tufted faces, adolescents that require thirteen to seventeen mice per night compared to their parents' meager consumption of four mice per day.

When the group ascended from the creek coulee and entered the fallowed pasture a Bobolink swayed on a tall spike of grass litter. The Bobolink, a prized tall grass prairie bird, is to me the coconut-filled bonbon of the bird world, their feathers a dichotomy of rich textures and colors. But I didn't expect such a fuss over one bird, for on my pasture there's not one, not a pair, but many—so many that half a dozen somersaulted through the sky right over our heads. Bobolinks nest on the ground in dense vegetation, their declining populations an argument for placing rangeland in permanent grassland easement (as is mine) and for building up grass litter.

Another ecological marker found that day was the Grasshopper Sparrow, nesting grounds also the open prairie, whose notable song impersonates the grasshopper—*tik tuk zeeeeeee*—a shrill, distinct call. Even without hearing a vocalization a member of our group identified this bird by its complete eye-ring and for its flat, and somewhat Neanderthal-ish forehead.

This sighting provided another thumbs up, for this sparrow's population is in decline as a result of prairie fragmentation.

The second part of our birding excursion each day was on one-hundred-and-twenty acres of native hay land west of the abbey. The field offers potholes and marshes, natural wetlands that attract water and shore birds. On day one, a group member called for a Virginia Rail that instead provoked a Black Crowned Night-heron's exploration. The second day the call enticed a rail's return call but alas, no sightings; the group seemed subdued. An interesting observance I discovered is the more enthusiastic the sighting the quieter birders become. And for this reason I withheld my excitement when Marbled Godwits appeared on the hay field, even though I was shouting and dancing inside. Their presence portends the future—land heals. A year of fallow followed by an early spring burn had already provided suitable habitat for this Pothole Prairie Region's grassland bird.

What the group couldn't know is that I had found my way here because of prairie potholes. While taking a class at Iowa State University in the fall of 2012, I'd heard about the declining populations of Lesser Scaup, the disappearance of the potholes within native land tracts, and the rapid conversion to tillable farmland, an ecological culprit that had already spoiled my home state of Iowa. But enough of me on my personal soap box...long live the prairie.

To close let me say that even before Woody's popularity, birders have been infatuated with the Pileated Woodpecker. For two days the groups searched for a Pileated, noting tree holes and listening for jackhammers, but to no avail. As the group slowly completed their pasture walk the last day, a silhouette approached from the north, a rapid projectile traveling in a line straight south, beak lifted, wings outstretched and primaries spread like fingers, red flame ablaze atop a smug, lifted head. This anthropomorphized Pileated Clint Eastwood smirked "*make my day*" as it flew over our heads, but made our day instead.

SAVING BIRDLIFE, ONE SMALL LIFE AT A TIME

or *Carefully Watch Your Grape Jelly Feeders!*

There were blobs of jelly on his face that I removed with my fingers so we didn't have to shower near his eyes.

Keeping him cupped in my hand, I held him in the sun for a few minutes—he simply let me—then he shook the water off and safely flew to the nearest bush!

I was exhausted afterwards, but so grateful that he was all right!

INTRODUCING PEER-REVIEW FOR *SOUTH DAKOTA BIRD NOTES*

The reality of academic ornithology is that publication must be in peer-reviewed outlets to be highly valued for current academic merit-based systems. This is becoming increasingly the norm within non-academic systems (e.g., government or non-government organizations) as well. The reason for the higher value for peer-reviewed journal articles is that these articles must pass through a thorough evaluation by “experts” in the particular field of study, which increases the chances that the science in the peer-reviewed article is sound and not flawed. In an effort to attract more articles dealing with ornithological science content to *South Dakota Bird Notes*, the SDOU Board of Directors at the spring 2014 meeting, agreed to institute a peer-review process for certain articles, at the request of the submitting author, in *South Dakota Bird Notes*. To this effect, President Olson appointed a Peer-Review Editorial Board at the spring 2014 meeting, consisting of Nancy Drilling (Rocky Mountain Bird Observatory), K.C. Jensen (South Dakota State University), Jeffrey Palmer (Dakota State University) and David Swanson (University of South Dakota).

South Dakota Bird Notes (SDBN) will continue to publish current non-peer-reviewed content, but will add peer-reviewed content beginning with Volume 67 in 2015. Peer-reviewed content will be clearly marked as such in the journal to distinguish it from non-peer-reviewed content and to reflect that the manuscript underwent a rigorous process of peer-review prior to publication. The content of peer-reviewed papers in SDBN may include any aspect of bird biology pertaining to birds in South Dakota and the Northern Prairie and Northern Great Plains regions, but we especially encourage manuscripts treating status and distribution, ecology, conservation and natural history topics.

Submission of Peer-Reviewed Manuscripts and Manuscript Structure

The author of a manuscript submitted to SDBN for peer-review should submit the manuscript to the Editor requesting that the manuscript undergo the peer-review process. Submitted manuscripts should follow the preparation guidelines currently listed on the SDOU website (www.sdou.org; click on Publications and Stuff, then on Instructions to Authors under the *South Dakota Bird Notes* tab). Manuscripts intended for peer-review must be submitted electronically to facilitate the peer-review process. Acceptable types of manuscripts include original research articles, which report the results of specific studies, or review articles, which summarize the literature on a particular ornithological topic. Both types of manuscripts must relate to the biology of birds of South Dakota or the Northern Prairie or Northern Great Plains regions. Both types of manuscripts must include an introductory Abstract summarizing the findings of the article in no more than 300 words. Original research manuscripts should include the following sections: Abstract, Introduction, Materials and Methods, Results, Discussion, Acknowledgments and Literature Cited. The use of subheadings where appropriate is encouraged.

Citations within the text should be listed by author(s) and date (e.g. Drilling 2010; Drilling and Palmer 2012). If the cited paper contains more than two authors it should be cited as Drilling et al. (2012). Citations in the Literature Cited section should follow the following format:

Peer-Review Process

Once a manuscript for which peer-review is requested by the author is received by the Editor, the Editor will forward the manuscript to a Peer-Review Editorial Board Member (EBM) with appropriate expertise for the topic of the manuscript. The EBM will then send out the manuscript for review to at least two external reviewers with recognized expertise in the subject matter of the manuscript. These reviewers will be charged with evaluating the scientific accuracy of the manuscript, the appropriateness of the study design and methods, including statistical analyses, whether the conclusions follow from the results, and other matters relating to the scientific validity of the manuscript. The reviewers will provide a ranking of the manuscript into one of the following four categories: Publish as is – no revisions needed, Minor Revisions required, Major Revisions required, or Reject. Upon receiving the reviews, the EBM will make a decision on whether to accept, ask for revisions, or reject the manuscript. If revisions are required, it is the responsibility of the submitting author(s) to revise the manuscript and to respond, in a point-by-point manner to comments and criticisms raised by the reviewers and EBM. Manuscripts with Minor or Major revision status will not be officially accepted for publication until the revised manuscript has been approved by the EBM. Final approval may be subject to another round of review. Rejected manuscripts may not be resubmitted to *SDBN* after a rejection decision.

Ethics Statement

All procedures included in manuscripts submitted to *SDBN* must conform to the Ornithological Council's *Guidelines to the Use of Wild Birds in Research* (Gaunt A.S., L.W. Oring. 2010. Guidelines to the use of wild birds in research, Third Edition. Ornithological Council, Washington, DC). In addition, all procedures must be approved by an Institutional Animal Care and Use Committee, if applicable, and an approved protocol number should be provided. Lastly, all activities in the study must be conducted under appropriate state and federal permits, with collecting permit numbers provided, if applicable. Statements assuring compliance to these requirements should be provided in the Methods and Materials section of the manuscript.

AN ACCIDENTAL RECORD

All sightings of “record birds,” I suspect, must be accidents; happy accidents if the observer is blessed with the means to prove said sighting. Perhaps this proof is by way of his or her respectability as an avian specialist, whose vast experience and knowledge of species and their field marks lends inarguable credence to the birder’s report. The observer may have developed great skill in sketching birds in the field, quickly diagramming field marks, noting behavior and habitat. But best of all, quick access to a camera is a wonderful thing. I fall into the latter category.

It’s ironic that the reason I wasn’t very well prepared for migratory feeding this year was because of birding. Let me explain. I’ve wanted to be “a birder” for almost as long as I can remember. Life gets in the way of pursuing personal desires sometimes. In April of this year, I succumbed to a mid-life crisis of sorts, and presented to my husband, Bill, whose own enjoyment of bird watching was coming to the surface (part of the reason for my timing), the idea that we should actually join the SDOU and attend the Spring Meeting of same to meet some South Dakota birders. He was delighted.

I was determined to have my “life list” compiled before my first-ever group birding experience. Surely, the upcoming trip to Milbank, SD, would permit me to garner many new bird species and I wanted to know definitively where I stood before attending. E-bird was my choice for officially organizing and documenting my vast collection of post-its, bird book notations, napkins, paper scraps and bird journal attempts. Two and a half large plastic tubs of developed photos had to be searched through for documentation followed by years of digital pictures on the computer. Several of the birds on my list had been seen while on trips; others during our infrequent outings to bird local sloughs. The vast majority however, had been experienced in our own yard.

The project took a few weeks and I convinced myself to not feel too guilty about letting some things slide to get it done. Once finished, I’d only need to keep up with it, I reasoned, and so my time was spent at the computer, away from the window, away from the birds. I ventured outside only briefly each day to keep the seed and suet feeders supplied, not concerning myself with fruit offerings; no orioles or catbirds yet.

Many people are surprised to hear that there are some warblers that enjoy fruit offerings, especially, and some exclusively, during migration. The Peterson Field Guide to Warblers of North America states, “*Fruit and nectar can be critically important food for many wood-warblers in the fall and winter months. Many warblers, as well as the Cape May Warbler, are regular nectar-feeders for much of the year. Small fruits sustain many warblers during fall migration and the winter months...Lingering warblers wintering well north of their normal range often visit suet feeders and other feeding stations.*” Likewise, we have had Tennessee and Cape May Warblers spend days frequenting our grape jelly and raisin feeders during migration. Until now, I’ve only been reactionary in my fruit feeding. I put the fruit out as soon as I see the first oriole or catbird. If a warbler or thrush shows up to partake, that’s an added delight for us, but I’ve never before put out fruit ahead of the birds. I will from now on.

The weather was ugly on 8 May 2014; cold and rainy and the wind was blowing, so it promised to be a good day to work on my project. I was finishing my morning household chores before retreating to the computer when I glanced around at the ground under the feeder tree 20 feet directly across from the window, a Russian Olive that had died at least 15 years ago, leaving the perfect natural fixture for hanging feeders and perching birds.

White-throated, White-crowned and Harris' Sparrows, rain-soaked, dotted the trees and the yet-to-sprout lawn. Goldfinches were on the sunflower hearts feeder hanging on the right side of the window.

My gaze moved to the left side of the window where I had a peanut dough suet cake feeder. A flash of bright yellow there made me think for an instant a goldfinch was there, too, but NO. *"Oh my gosh, what is that? OK, that's a warbler. Has to be. Looks like a warbler, has the right beak, shaped right, right size, but what IS it? Why don't I know my warblers? I was going to study them this winter! It's why I bought the book!"* My mind was racing. *Run for the camera? It's in the hall closet, on the top shelf, IN THE BAG. Is there time? No. Memorize it. Yellow head, **bold** yellow head. No head markings, no eye line, no eye ring, Okay. Round little guy. Eye is black. So are the legs. He's a funny color on the back, gray but kind of greenish and it goes up the nape. Wing bars, how many? Two bold white ones. Okay. Look at that black throat patch, wow, bold. Is it that, uh, what was that a few years ago? That Black-throated Green Warbler? No, I don't think so, something is different. This bird looks so – "clean." OK, stay, stay. Let me get the camera. Please, stay.*

I ran to the hall closet, pleading out loud. "I need a photo to help me ID this bird." Back to the rain-sheeted window which was spotted from a winter's season of blowing dirt and snow, I quickly scanned for the mystery bird. There, on the spruce. Get the camera on it. *"Now, where? On the ground,"* Snap, snap, snap. *"Is the flash going? I think so; that's not good but keep shooting. What's he want? He ate some suet but nothing on the ground. Now he's on the jelly feeder, but no jelly in it. Why don't I have jelly in it?"* And then it was over. A semi roaring by on the highway scattered all of the birds to the nearby trees. A moment later they all returned. All but one.

Later that afternoon I decided to sit down and find the bird in my books. My photos were terrible from the rain on the window and the camera flash going off. But – they would do for identification. [See Back Cover of this issue. ~Ed.] I was confounded when I didn't see it in the Eastern guides. I had learned to do an initial search of a new bird by perusing the range maps first, then looking at the photos/drawings of the birds common to our area, but that wasn't working this time. I was elated to finally find a matching photo in the National Wildlife Federation Field Guide to the Birds of North America. "There's my bird!" My eyes dropped to the range map and I swallowed hard. "But what's it doing here?" It was a Hermit Warbler.

It was a while before the impact of my accident sank in. How strange. I confirmed for myself in book after book and on the internet – Hermit Warbler. I wondered if one had ever been seen in our state, so I looked on e-bird under first sightings in South Dakota. Wow, not there, but perhaps not everything gets reported on e-bird. *"I guess I need to report it,"* I thought. *"I wonder what will happen. I wonder if I'm right."*

So here I was, not new to birding, but certainly new to the birding world, and to submitting a report of a possible state first record bird! I didn't hear anything for a couple of weeks on my report to e-bird and having finished my "life list" project, I thought I'd revisit the SDOU website to get up to speed before the much anticipated Spring Meeting. On the website, I found that the SDOU has a Rare Bird Reporting Form, and realized I absolutely must fill it out and submit it, preferably before the Spring Meeting. After all, though I had not met a single one, these were my people and they would decide what I had seen.

The 2014 Spring Meeting in Milbank exceeded my hopes in every way imaginable. The SDOU members were welcoming and friendly, and though I was a bit apprehensive about how my "accident" would be viewed by birders far more experienced than myself, I was warmed by the genuine congratulations offered this newcomer. I have spent the summer months trying to develop some of the field birding skills I observed from my new associ-

ates and learning from the observations and comments on the SDOU list serve. Soon, I hope to be a useful, contributing member of this wonderful organization!

The Mary E. Baylor Memorial Scholarship is awarded to a South Dakota college or university undergraduate student who is in her/his junior or senior year. A biology major with a particular interest in ornithology, ecology, wildlife management, biological education or medicine is a requirement. The recipient of this year's \$1,200.00 scholarship is Don E. Poeckes who is majoring in biology in the Biodiversity and Conservation track at the University of South Dakota. According to Dr. David Swanson who nominated Mr. Poeckes for this award, Don has a strong interest in ornithology, particularly field ornithology.

Three scholarships/awards will be offered in the 2014-15 academic year by SDOU. The first is the Mary E. Baylor Memorial Scholarship in the amount of \$1,200.00. The requirements for this scholarship are listed above. Students wishing to be considered for this scholarship should ask a department head, advisor or professor to nominate them.

Second is the Kenneth H. Husmann Memorial Scholarship. First awarded in 1989, this scholarship is presented to a graduate student attending a South Dakota college or university. Faculty members nominate a deserving student who is majoring in ornithology, ecology or wildlife management. The \$500.00 award will be presented to the winning student at the beginning of the 2015 fall term.

The Alfred E. Hinds Memorial Award for Ornithology, established in 1983, is presented to a deserving individual, student or an organization/agency that has made a significant contribution to the advancement of ornithology in South Dakota. It may also be used to fund a special SDOU project which needs financial support. Nominations may be submitted at any time with the award being announced in spring of 2015.

SEASONAL REPORTS

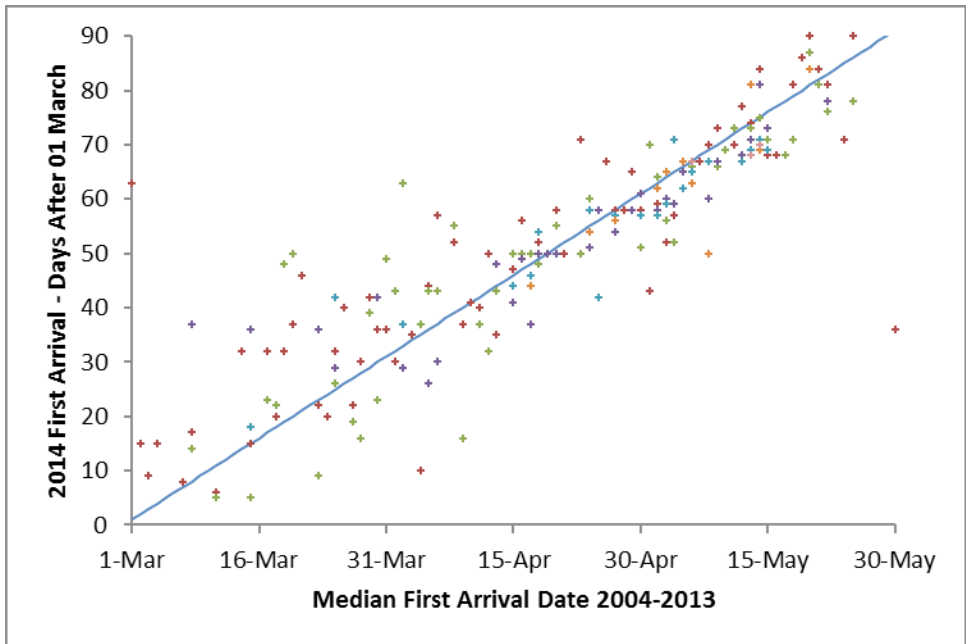
The 2014 Spring Season

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There were 324 species, including 13 rarities, reported during the season. The ten-year (2004-2013) average is 324. Below, I have tried to highlight the more significant sightings (dates that are among the earliest/latest included in the online database and species that are out of range). For early/late migration dates, I have listed the three earliest/latest dates (by county); however, if these did not include a sighting East River, West River, and along the Missouri River, I have given the earliest/latest reported date in the missing region also. Finally, included at the end is a list of species (20) that were not reported this year and might be expected during the Spring Season. A species is placed on the list if it was not reported this year but had been reported during spring in at least 2 of the previous 5 years. Numbers in parentheses indicates the number of consecutive years (up to 4) that the species has appeared on the list during the season.

For species with early dates given in this report, the graph below shows the first arrival date reported during the current season (days after 01 March) versus the median first arrival date over the previous ten years (2004-2013). Data points above the line represent species whose earliest reported first arrival this spring was later than the 10-year median and points below the line correspond to species with first arrival spring dates that were earlier than the 10-year median.

Illustrated Checklist of the Birds of the World, Vol. 1. Non-passerines. Josep del Hoyo and Nigel J. Collar. 903 pp. Hardbound. \$194.65.

Handbook of the Birds of the World—Alive. Subscription website. Approximately \$40 or \$60 annually. (Two levels; Priced in Euros.)

Almost any birder will greatly enjoy the *Illustrated Checklist of the Birds of the World, Volume 1*—but it is a large, heavy, expensive book. The book contains 357 plates containing 8290 small, thumb-sized illustrations of the non-passerines of the world. These drawings are generally very good, but tend to be in a cookie-cutter style, with birds often in identical poses.

The book is not meant to be an identification guide, but rather is a review of avian diversity. The color plates each contain about two-dozen birds and show species and many subspecies. Small range maps are included on each plate. Opposite each plate is a page giving alternative names, taxonomic notes, and subspecies and distribution. There is also a note on population status and a reference to where the bird appears in the 17-volume, *Handbook of the Birds of the World*, thus serving as an index to that monumental work.

The 30-page introduction is an interesting discussion about how species evolve and how they are defined. Also covered are definitions of terminology and the general layout of the species accounts. The book ends with at least 30 large atlas-sized maps of the regions of the world, including topographical landmarks and often political boundaries within countries (states and provinces). Finally, the book ends with a list of 2126 bibliographic references.

If you don't have the \$400 required for this volume and the upcoming checklist for all the passerines, or the \$3760 (a 20% discount) for the whole 17-volume, *Handbook of the Birds of the World*, then consider the *Handbook of Birds of the World—Alive (HBW—Alive)*.

HBW—Alive is the web version of the *Handbook*. You can buy a yearly subscription for approximately \$40 annually. The website is massive, covering all 13,367 pages written by 277 authors, 10200 maps, and containing some 15 million words. You can search for bird families and species accounts for any of the birds of the world. But what is awesome is that *HBW—Alive* is being continually updated with new ornithological information, making the website truly alive and a vision into our technological future.

HBW—Alive lacks the sumptuous photographs of the *Handbook*. In their place are links to a wide array of still and video sequences of the birds. At this time, this includes over 82,000 videos, 111,000 photos and 12,000 sound recordings covering 94% of the bird species of the world. Links also exist to the original literature cited in the text—although this ability is available only to Supporting Members for about \$60 per year.

HBW—Alive also allows you to keep personal notes and to create printable country checklists, complete with color illustrations of every species. Keeping life-lists is also possible for Supporting Members. Updates from the ornithological journals of the world are also available.

I have barely scratched the surface of what a stupendous resource this website offers. Anyone seriously interested in birds should check out this address:
