

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FALL 2013 SDOU MEETING

he biannual South Dakota Ornithologists' Union Fall Meeting was held 8 – 10 November 2013 at the Governor's Inn in Pierre, SD. Forty-two people attended the conference which included guest speakers, morning field trips, presentations on current bird research in the state, and the SDOU General Membership and Board of Directors meetings. Events started Friday evening with a social hour and tutorial by Dave Swanson on identifying birds by their songs. Saturday evening, photographer Doug Backlund showed photos of the bird highlights of his recent trip to Texas. Saturday and Sunday morning field trips to local birding areas yielded some late-fall and winter species such as Bohemian Waxwing, Purple Finch, Winter Wren, and a Pacific Loon.

As is the tradition at the Fall SDOU meeting, most of Saturday was devoted to presentations on current and recent research and conservation projects in South Dakota. Prof. Kent Jensen of South Dakota State University started the session by summarizing the results of Greater Sage-Grouse research by SDSU graduate students. Next were two students who are researching the effects of different management practices on birds. Jessica Panning talked about the effects of timber thinning on Black Hills breeding birds while Christi Loehler presented her findings on the effects of winter grazing on grassland birds. Raeann Mettler was the lone representative from Black Hills State University; she summarized her research on the grosbeak hybrid zone in southern South Dakota. Two presenters from the University of South Dakota, graduate student Yufeng Zhang, and Prof. Dave Swanson, focused on their metabolism studies in small birds. Ming Liu, a Ph.D. candidate at USD and frequent presenter at SDOU fall meetings, updated listeners on his study of migrant bird stopover habitat quality. In another update from a past presenter, Ester Munes talked about the effects of the 2011 flood on bird populations. Two new studies have started at USD. Ryan Munes explained early results of his analysis of the Dakotas Christmas Bird Count bird data trends and climate change while Gretchen Newberry explained the importance of her new study on Common Nighthawks in southeastern South Dakota. The lone nonuniversity speaker was Cheryl Mandich from the American Bird Conservancy. She spoke on Long-billed Curlew habitat conservation in the northern Great Plains.

At the SDOU General Membership meeting, members voted for five Board Members who began a new three-year term at the Fall meeting. They are Kelly Preheim of Armour, Scott Stoltz of Pierre, Douglas Chapman of Sioux Falls, Marie Curtin of Custer, and Gene Hess of Rapid City. At the Board Meeting, board members elected officers for 2014. Ricky Olson of Pierre is President, Roger Dietrich of Yankton is Vice-president, Rosemary Draeger of Sioux Falls is Treasurer, David Swanson of Vermillion is Secretary, Jeff Palmer of Madison is Librarian, and Douglas Chapman is the *South Dakota Bird Notes* editor.

The spring meeting will be held in Milbank at the Lantern Motel May 23-25, 2014, while the fall 2014 meeting will be held in Vermillion. More details will be distributed in the upcoming months.

embers—you are the heartbeat of SDOU. Thank you for your ongoing participation, your interest in nesting and migrating birds throughout South Dakota, your role in building the SDOU database, and for making birding such a lively lifetime passion! Your membership supports scholarships and awards for ornithological research as well as publication of our quarterly *South Dakota Bird Notes*.

Special thanks to our Sustaining Members. Your contribution above basic dues boosts SDOU's ability to support our various research, award, and scholarship efforts and expands understanding of the birds of South Dakota and the influences on their ability to thrive in our state.

And to our Life Members, thank you for your commitment. Life members provide substantial support by paying dues once for a lifetime.

Historically, when SDOU was formed in 1949, regular memberships were \$3.00. When the Life membership category was created in 1977 it was \$125. Dues have been slowly increased over the years as costs of printing and mailing *SD Bird Notes* has increased. For example, in the 1990s, regular dues were raised to \$16 and life memberships were raised to \$200. A significant portion of the dues currently pays for the cost of printing and mailing four issues of *SD Bird Notes* a year. In 2013, the cost was \$14 a year per membership or \$3251 for the year.

Currently, the primary categories for membership include regular, \$20; family, \$25, and student, \$10. Members who contribute \$40 are sustaining. Life members pay \$400 for an individual and \$500 for a family. Other categories include libraries and organizations which pay \$30, and a special \$350 membership for SD Game, Fish and Parks (which then receives 25 copies of *SD Bird Notes*). Our South Dakota senators and representative receive a copy of *SD Bird Notes* gratis, and two copies go to the Center for Western Studies for the SDOU archives.

As of 6 November 2013, we had 187 memberships on the rolls. The current breakdown of memberships by category for the year is the following:

90 regular

15 sustaining

35 life members (includes 2 charter members)

29 family

1 student

16 libraries & organizations

UNUSUAL CONCENTRATION OF MIGRATING MCCOWN'S LONGSPURS IN NORTHWESTERN SOUTH DAKOTA

arly on the morning of April 28, 2013 I was travelling gravel roads in southern Harding County when I came across a male McCown's Longspur (*Rhynchophanes mccownii*) (MCLO) feeding on Dillon Road. This observation, made before 6:30 AM, was the start of an amazing day of migration, observed not only by myself but by Charlie Miller of Buffalo and Doug Backlund of Pierre.

That single bird was six miles east of the Harding Road junction. Continuing on, I found a flock of up to 30 birds about 1.5 miles east of Harding Road and a smaller group of six birds about 0.5 miles east of the junction. At this point, I called Charlie and Doug; when they got to the area around 8:00 AM, the birds were still around. We then went separate ways, driving different roads to look for more longspurs. This is what we found, including the original flocks.

- 1) Dillon Road, Harding Co., 6 -8 miles east of Harding Rd. Up to six birds
- 2) Dillon Road, Harding Co., 1.5 miles east of Harding Rd. Up to 30 birds.
- 3) Dillon Road, Harding Co., 0.5 miles east of Harding Rd. Up to 8 birds.
- 4) Clayton Road, Harding Co., 4 miles north of Hwy 20. Flock of ~25.
- 5) Clayton Road, Harding Co., 5.5 miles north of Hwy 20. 1 MCLO with ∼12 Chestnut-collared Longspurs.
- 6) Dunn Road, Harding Co., 2 miles east of Harding Rd. 1 bird in a prairie dog town.
- 7) JB Road, Harding Co., ~5.25 miles east of Hwy 85, ~25 birds. Interestingly there were no MCLO at 5:30 AM when I drove by, but this flock had appeared by midmorning and stayed until at least mid-afternoon.
- 8) Harding Cutoff Road, Butte Co., 2.7 miles north of old Hwy 85 junction. 7 MCLO in mixed flock with Vesper Sparrows and Horned Larks.
- 9) Harding Cutoff Road, Butte Co., 1 mile north of old Hwy 85 junction. 10 MCLO and 2 Horned Larks.

In most cases, except where noted, the flocks were almost entirely made up of MCLO, both male and female, with an occasional Horned Lark or Chestnut-collared Longspur mixed in. This despite the fact that there were large flocks of Horned Larks, Sparrows, American Pipits and Chestnut-collareds everywhere. The longspurs typically were foraging on the road or in the short grass at the side of the road. The birds, when flushed, would go into adjacent pastures, hayfields, and weedy fields and eventually would come back to the road. Notably, we did not find any MCLO in areas dominated by sagebrush. The last observations of MCLO were made around 4:00 PM. The next day, Doug Backlund drove some of these same roads but he did not find a single McCown's Longspur and none were seen the rest of the migration period.

McCown's Longspur is a 'casual migrant' in the state, mostly reported in the western-most counties of Fall River, Butte, and Harding (Tallman et al. 2002). Most observations of the species are of one or two birds at a time (SDOU). An exception is an unusual concentration of 200 birds seen October 1991 in Fall River Co. (Peterson in Springer, 1993). Rosche (1982) reported that MCLO sometimes are grounded by April snowstorms and then are found in large numbers along gravel roads. These two observations confirm that this species can be found in large concentrations during migration and suggest that this occurs because

October - December 2013

In October through December in contrast to last fall, many scoters and Long-tailed Ducks were reported. There were several reports from West River, thought to be a result of more observers looking for waterfowl.

Also in October, a hunter reported a Black-bellied Whistling Duck from Brown County.

An adult Great Black-backed Gull appeared in Pierre for a time. After not being seen in Pierre, presumably the same gull was reported from Big Bend Dam, then Gavin's Point Dam..

In December a Common Raven was observed in the canyon at Hanna, SD, and another was sighted along I-90 near mile marker 272. There seems to be a trend of more raven sightings.

Michael Melius reported a possible Pacific Wren along Rapid Creek in Rapid City SD. An Iceland Gull was sighted at Pierre.

Amazingly, this year South Dakota recorded its second, third and fourth state records of an Anna's Hummingbird, pending approval by the Rare Bird Record Committee.

- The first week of August Randy Podoll discovered an Anna's Hummingbird in his yard in Sturgis. It was last seen on 10/14/13.
- Richard Latuchie found an Anna's Hummingbird in his Rapid City backyard on 8/30/2013 and it stayed until 9/30/13.
- Then Ron Mabie sighted an Anna's Hummingbird at his feeder in Pickstown SD on 10/16/2013 which stayed until 11/03/13.

So far this winter, there have not many reports of northern birds coming down. There have been only a couple reports of Snowy Owls and Gyrfalcons and a few reports of Bohemian Waxwings and Purple Finches.

BURROWING OWL SURVEYS IN SOUTHWEST SOUTH DAKOTA: AN UPDATE

In Vol. 59 No. 2 (June 2007) of *South Dakota Bird Notes*, I reported results of Burrowing Owl counts I'd made in my local area of northeast Custer County. The counts were made in 1998 and from 2003 to 2007. (For a discussion of how the counts were conducted, see the original article.) Here are the counts made in the years since:

2008: Aug. 1: 18 in 4 broods 2009: July 17: 19 in 4 broods

2010: Aug. 20: 30

2011: Aug. 6: 26 in 5(?) broods 2012: June 26: 66 in 11 broods

2013: Aug. 30: 31

Some information also needs updating. The area of Prairie Dog town available for the owls is much reduced from what I mapped in 2007. Essentially, all the area south of Spring Creek Road had been eliminated by landowners' poisoning efforts by the end of 2008. This leaves approximately 28 hectares (70 acres) of Prairie Dogs.

In 2007 I started trying to count the number of broods. (That year there were 45 young and adult birds in 9 broods.) Prior to 2008, all the counts were conducted in July. Since then, only one has been in July. It becomes more difficult to accurately assess the number of broods as the young fledge and disperse. Thus, two of the August counts listed here have no brood counts, and one is uncertain.

The 2012 breeding season was phenomenal. The first-of-year date was early, 28 March, when I heard two Burrowing Owls calling at sunset. I saw the first young out of a burrow also at an early date, 9 June, and before June was over I was counting the highest number of owls since I started surveying in 1998. The owls' early nesting is probably attributable to the warm, dry weather that spring, and their success I would credit in part to the abundance of grasshoppers that year, food to be had just by stepping outside their burrows.

By contrast, the 2013 breeding season seemed difficult for the owls. Grasshoppers were rare, having died off in August, 2012, and voles and mice were down in numbers also. I counted 23 adult Burrowing Owls in the area on 10 May. I struggled to get a good count as the young birds emerged from burrows, finally reaching the high of 31 on 30 August. Judging from owl pellets I found during the summer,

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crickets appeared to be a major part of the owls' diet.

The prairie dogs in this immediate area are thriving, and show no sign of being infected by sylvatic plague. Control efforts by landowners continue, but not to the point of eliminating this rodent that is vital to Burrowing Owls' nesting.

SHARP-SHINNED HAWKS MOVE WITH COLD FRONT

On 18 September 2013 I was camping with a friend at the Cheyenne River in northeast Custer County. The area is federal land in the Buffalo Gap National Grasslands.

The day had been warm, with a high temp over 32 deg. C (90 F). About an hour before sunset, a cold front approached, bringing a sudden strong north wind. Immediately, Sharp-shinned Hawks appeared, flying from the north. In the course of 20 minutes, we saw 15 Sharp-shinned Hawks. They were usually single birds, although we did see two or three at once sometimes.

The Cheyenne River flows north-northeast here, and there is a forest dominated by cottonwood trees along it. Most of the hawks were flying just above the treetops. On the shore where we were standing the river flows west to east for about 800 meters, so we were in a perfect place to see the hawks as they emerged into open view and crossed the river.

Several buteos and an adult Bald Eagle were also seen flying with the wind. This is one of the earliest fall dates I've seen a Bald Eagle in northeast Custer County.

The cold front had been predicted by the National Weather Service; I'd read the online text version earlier in the day. The accuracy of modern forecasts presents an opportunity for birders to be out in forested habitats on fall days, anticipating hawk movements ahead of cold fronts.

SOUTH DAKOTA'S FIRST WILSON'S PLOVER RECORD

n 20 August 2010 I was looking for shorebirds in a flooded stubble field bordering 304th Ave. approximately one-half mile north of Hwy 14 in Hughes County.. I observed a plover that I at first thought was a Killdeer. My next thought was that maybe it was a Semi-palmated Plover. The more I studied it, the more I noticed things that did not add up: it was too small for a Killdeer, the bird's bill was too thick and long for a Semi-palmated Plover and the body size was too large. The facial pattern did not fit Killdeer or Semi-palmated Plover.

I looked in my field guides and thought, maybe Wilson's Plover. I hurriedly digiscoped many pictures from different angles to document the bird. As this bird was in transition plumage I was not confident in my identification. I sent photos to several people to get their opinion of the identification. Only Jeff Palmer responded and said it looked different enough I should submit a rare bird report and the committee could discuss it. I was still not sure, so not wanting to damage my identification credibility, I shelved it.

This summer I was looking at the Minnesota Ornithologists' Union's website. In the photo section titled "Recently Seen", I discovered that in May, Minnesota had a Wilson's Plover record. Thinking about my old photos, I sent them to four people other than those I had first contacted. All four thought it was a Wilson's Plover. One of these observers was Dan Svingen who asked me if I wanted to ask his brother Peder Svingen in Minnesota to look at them. I said sure that would be great! Peder Svingen replied that the ID marks supported an identification of Wilson's Plover.

Thus, I submitted a rare bird report. In Novermber, 2013, it passed the committee. Technically, until the report has been published in *SD Bird Notes*, the record is not officially accepted as of this date. Our rules state that a Rare Bird becomes accepted only at the time of publication of the report.

SEASONAL REPORTS

The 2013 Summer Season

he primary goal of the Summer Season compilation is to report Confirmed Breeding records observed during the season. There were 124 species reported as Confirmed Breeding this year, The secondary objectives of the Summer Season summary include sightings of rare (or at least infrequently reported) species, late spring and early fall migration dates, and species that are reported from unusual locations. There were 267 species, including 3 rarities, reported during the season. The ten-year (2002-2011) average is 259. A full listing of all reported sightings can be obtained from the online database. This report contains those sightings and species which seemed to be consistent with the objectives of the Summer Season as described above.

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of weather events. Possibly we witnessed such a migration fall-out in the middle of the prairie. April 18 started off as a fairly calm sunny day, but north winds quickly picked up and were quite stiff throughout the day. The next day was entirely calm. This suggests that the birds that were migrating north on the morning of April 18 were grounded by the stiff north winds and they continued their migration when the winds died down.

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USING EBIRD TO SIMPLIFY DATA ENTRY AND LEVERAGE YOUR BIRDING RECORDS

If you've thought about submitting your birding records to SDOU, and prefer birding to data entry, we have developed a small conversion program that will let you enter your observations into eBird, and then, with just a small additional step, convert it so that it can be used by the South Dakota Ornithological Union (SDOU). The purpose of this article is to discuss the uses of your birding data, how you can contribute to "citizen science", and how to minimize the time it takes to accomplish this. A small group of SDOU members have tested this program over the last 6 months, and we are now ready to invite all SDOU members to use it.

It has always seemed to me that birders tend to have amazing memory. Ask most birders where and when they saw their first Great Gray Owl, and chances are they will tell you something like, "February 2012 just north of Duluth, Minnesota". Most of us, over time, start to accumulate fairly detailed records of what we've seen and where we've seen it. For many years, accumulating notebooks, or other types of written records was the norm. With the advent of personal computers, many birders started to utilize their computers to store this information. Some birders utilized simple spreadsheet software like Microsoft Excel, or database software like Access or dBase to keep more and more detailed records. And then some specialized software products were developed for birders. A couple of the more popular programs today are Avisys and Thayer Birding Software. When I started birding, in 2008, I bought Avisys, and have used it to record all my observations. It keeps track of life lists, state and county lists, year lists, and can produce a lot of interesting information. If I see a new life bird in my back-yard, such as the Whitewinged Crossbill I observed last January, recording it in Avisys instantly updates my Yard, County, State, ABA, and Life lists automatically.

The SDOU has had an on-going interest in providing useful and interesting information to its members on the abundance, distribution and timing of bird species across the State of South Dakota. It quickly realized that all its members could keep their own detailed records, but it didn't really enable the information to be shared in a meaningful way. So the database of the SDOU was created, enabling members to share their sightings. Over time, that Access database has grown steadily as a relatively small group of avid birders took the time to enter all their data into the database. It has become a useful source of information to members, so for example, when I saw my first American Tree Sparrow of the fall today, I could quickly determine whether it was unusually early in Meade County, or anywhere else for that matter. Jeff Palmer uses this database to produce the compelling quarterly reports seen in *SD Bird Notes*.

In 2002, the Cornell Lab of Ornithology, along with the National Audubon Society developed eBird, which they describe as "A real-time, online checklist program". Web-based, eBird's goal is to "maximize the utility and accessibility of the vast numbers of bird observations made each year by recreational and professional bird watchers. It is amassing one of the largest and fastest growing biodiversity data resources in existence. For example, in March 2012, participants reported more than 3.1 million bird observations across North America!"

Over time, eBird has evolved into an international system where birders can record all their observations worldwide. The data are utilized by extensively by researchers, ornithologists, land managers, and others. It is supported by the National Science Foundation, as well as several private foundations. In time these data will become the foundation for a better understanding of bird distribution across the western hemisphere and beyond. One of many uses for these data is to fuel the real-time migration forecasts of BirdCast, another project off the Cornell Lab.

The use of eBird has grown dramatically in the last 5 years, and younger birders are likely to be familiar with—and therefore—use this system. In order to incent birders to contribute their data to eBird, the developers have worked hard to ease the work of data entry, and add value for the average user. Similar to the stand-alone systems, eBird will store all your lists, but it goes further. EBird utilizes Google Maps to visualize the distribution of species. It enables birders to quickly develop target lists for trips to areas they might be unfamiliar with, can generate bar-charts on a state or county-wide basis, and for those who are into the competitive side of things, it generates top 100 lists for all geographic regions, on a yearly, and life basis.

Three common reasons given for not using eBird are:

- 1. "I don't know why I would trust this data."
- 2. "I have 25 years of records, way too much to enter into eBird."
- 3. "What happens if eBird doesn't last?"

Well... there is a network of several hundred volunteers, worldwide, who help monitor the data, and validate unusual findings, before they are included in the publicly available data. And you can simply start to add your new records to the database if you like, and then you can back-enter your life list, as well as state lists, etc., so that your eBird data will give you instant access to all your lists, on any computer that has web-access. And one of the nice things about eBird, and what enabled us to develop the conversion program, is the fact that at any given time, you can obtain fall your data rom eBird in a format that can easily be used by spreadsheets or databases.

So by this time, you may be thinking that you are going to need to spend more time VOL. 65, NO. 4 PAGE 98 DECEMBER 2013

on data entry than on birding. For a number of us, the time spent on entering these data has become a challenge. Most of us would prefer to be out birding, rather than sitting in front of a computer. And indeed, if you are going to manually enter your data into the eBird and SDOU databases, it can be repetitive, and time consuming. Fortunately, this is where our new utility program comes in.


Several times during the year, Jeff Palmer sends out an email to SDOU members, reminding us to submit our seasonal data to the database. What we will do at this point is as follows:

- 1. Download our dataset from eBird
- 2. Get the latest version of the conversion program.
- 3. Run the Program on your dataset.
- 4. Send the resulting file to Dick Latuchie.

I will compile all the individual files into one large file and forward it to Jeff Palmer who will then upload the file into the SDOU database.

All SDOU members can utilize this program. EBird is has gone through a number of upgrades and data entry is streamlined, considerably easier to load data into than SDOU. If you already use eBird then you will eliminate the need to separately enter data into the SDOU database. This might also be the opportunity for those of you who are entering your data into SDOU, but not into eBird, to take a good look at eBird. And if you currently are not doing either I hope we have given you a few good reasons to seriously consider it.
