The unfortunate report by the world's leading scientific journal, SCIENCE (Sept 2019) a few years ago said that 2.9 billion breeding adult birds have been lost since 1970. That is more than one in four birds gone forever in less than a single human lifetime. These staggering numbers of course are depressing for us bird supporters and can make us feel like all hope is lost. For us to continue our mission to promote the study of birds in South Dakota, we need living breathing birds left for us to study. There are little things we can do as individuals to help the plight of birds, such as making our yards and gardens better habitats by choosing native plants; minimizing bird strikes in problem windows of our homes by leaving the shades down to lessen sky reflection; and using less or eliminating pesticides, fertilizers, and salts that contaminate their habitat.





thrive. A question to be asked is, "What can SDOU do as an organization about the continuing widespread depletion of birds and their habitats?" While researching the early years of SDOU, I found that during some time periods SDOU was actively involved in bird protection and habitat conservation. During the late 50's and early 60's they formed a liaison committee made up of SDOU members that worked side by side with the South Dakota Game, Fish and Parks Department to protect great horned owls, sharp-shinned hawks and Coopers hawks. This ultimately led to the passage of SD Bill 90 on hawk and owl protection (*Bird Notes* March 1961). A wonderful success for SDOU! (And a big sigh of relief from our South Dakota hawks and owls because at that time protections were limited.)

During this time period SDOU also passed two resolutions at its annual meeting (*Bird Notes* March 1962). The first was that all government assistance for drainage of wetlands in South Dakota should be stopped. The second was that a new National Wildlife Refuge should be set up to offset the sandbars being used by Sandhill Cranes that were to be lost by building the Oahe Dam on the Missouri River. Of course, we all love seeing the gulls that flock to the huge reservoirs on this now dammed river but so many riparian areas were lost along with the miles of sandbars. This river's edge habitat provided food and shelter not only for the cranes but also to birds that lived there year-round, and the river's edge also benefited birds who used it for summer breeding grounds and migration stopover.

Definitely, environmental tragedies like building of the dams, plowing of the prairies and draining of the wetlands contributed to the vast numbers of bird losses in this state, and I am proud that SDOU at the time stood up for our birds. These two early resolutions were both targeted and local and this made them more legitimate to other environmental organizations and allies of the time to see that we agreed and supported them in their conservation efforts. Even though these two resolutions may have had no teeth, they showed that our founders cared considerably about bird protection and conservation of their habitats. Currently, I believe there are projects that we could get behind and support, environmental concerns that could be addressed, and other dangers to our birds that need to be publicized. SDOU's stance and actions on the detriments facing birds today will not only be beneficial to birds, but also show our successors that threats to birdlife were perceived by us and we did our best to help.

2022 Report of the Rare Bird Records Committee

The SDOU Rare Bird Records Committee (RBRC) met virtually on 15 May 2022 for the spring meeting and in-person for the fall meeting in Sioux Falls on 2 October 2022. The RBRC acted on records submitted since the last meeting of the committee on 6 November 2021. Rare Bird Reports were circulated to all members electronically and the committee acted on reports not receiving unanimous ratings electronically during the meetings. The members of the committee were David Swanson (Chair and Secretary), Chris Anderson, Nancy Drilling, Todd Jensen, Ricky Olson, Jeffrey Palmer, and Scott Stolz.

Springer (1988. South Dakota Bird Notes 40:67-70) outlined the purpose and voting procedures of the RBRC. The RBRC strongly encourages observers of rare or unusual birds in South Dakota to report their observations to the secretary of the RBRC (David Swanson of Vermillion, SD), preferably via email at david.swanson@usd.edu. A Rare Bird Report Form is available in electronic format for this purpose from David Swanson, or a form can be downloaded from http://www.sdou.org/, by clicking on the Birds link, then on the Rare Birds link, and then clicking on the Download MS Word template link for the report form. A summary of the type of information desired by the RBRC in a rare bird report can be found in Swanson (2015. South Dakota Bird Notes 67:64-71).

The RBRC requests rare bird reports for species listed as hypothetical or accidental in the state. The Species Review List is available from the SDOU website by clicking on the *Species Review List* tab under the *Rare Birds* link. The RBRC also requests reports of bird species from a portion of the state or time of year where that species is listed as accidental. A listing of birds belonging to these categories in South Dakota is provided in the latest versions of the Distributional and Seasonal checklists of South Dakota birds, accessible at http://www.sdou.org/ by clicking on the *Birds* link and then clicking on the links for the *Seasonal* or *Distributional checklists*. The RBRC regularly adds or removes species from the review list, based on current data, and these changes to the review list are summarized in the annual reports of the RBRC in *South Dakota Bird Notes*. In addition, reports are requested for observations listed in the "Species Requiring Acceptance by the Rare Bird Records Committee" section in the Seasonal Reports of *South Dakota Bird Notes*. Observers whose records are accepted (Classes 1 and 2) are encouraged to publish these records in *South Dakota Bird Notes*, so details of the observation can be communicated to a wider audience.

Following are the results of the committee's action for records acted upon in 2022. The parenthetical numbers accompanying some reports indicate the committee's vote. If no numbers are listed, the vote was unanimous. The committee wishes to emphasize that a rating of Class 3 or 4 (non-accepted record) does not imply any personal criticism of the observer. Such a rating only means that the information provided in the report, in the opinion of the committee, did not conclusively eliminate other similar species.

CLASS 1 (Accepted - Specimen, photograph, or recording).

Painted Bunting. 25 May 2022. One adult male at Wall, Pennington Co. Photographed, Ken Thompson. Eighth state record.

CLASS 2 (Accepted – Satisfactory written description).

Tundra Swan. 23 March 2022. Five adults near Bison, Perkins Co. Scott Stolz. Photographs submitted with the report were supportive of the identification but were distant and not diagnostic, thus the Class 2 rating. Rare migrant in far western South Dakota.

Mute Swan. 19 August 2021. Two in juvenile plumage on the Missouri River, south of Elk Point, Union Co. Dave Swanson. Casual visitor.

Olive-sided Flycatcher (nesting record). 21 July 2022. Two adults on the ridge separating Keogh and Ward draws, Lawrence Co. One adult carried food repeatedly to a dense area of branches near the top of a spruce tree, the other was singing occasionally from the top of the same tree. Scott Stolz. First confirmed nesting record for the state.

Mountain Chickadee. 13 July 2021. Two adults at Horse Thief Lake Trail, Pennington Co. Mike Fernandez. (6 Class 2, 1 Class 3). Fourth state record.

Tufted Titmouse. 8 May 2022. One at Sioux Falls, Minnehaha Co. Todd Jensen. (5 Class 2, 1 Abstention). Accidental visitor.

Tufted Titmouse. 16 July 2022. One near Big Stone Lake, Lake Township, Roberts Co. Lauren Hatch. Accidental visitor.

Nashville Warbler. 15 July 2022. One adult male at Big Sioux Recreation Area, Minnehaha Co. Leigh Spencer. (6 Class 2, 1 Class 3). Third July record.

Kentucky Warbler. 14 May 2022. One adult male at Richmond Lake State Recreation Area, Brown Co. Gary Olson. Rare to Casual migrant and summer visitor.

Cape May Warbler. 13 May 2022. One adult male at Oelrichs, Fall River Co. Peter Hill. Sixth record for western South Dakota.

CLASS 3 (Not accepted – Identification possibly correct but description not completely convincing).

Mississippi Kite. 18 June 2022. One first summer bird at Lake Madison, Lake Co. (4 Class 2, 2 Class 3).

The dissenting committee members felt that a light effect couldn't be ruled out and were bothered by the lack of a mention of the pale gray head in the report.

Hammond's Flycatcher. 5 September 2021. One in fresh basic plumage at Ardmore, Fall River Co. (3 Class 2, 2 Class 3). Dissenting committee members noted that some key points (e.g., the underside of the lower mandible, primary extension) were missing from the report, so that juvenile Least Flycatcher was not conclusively ruled out.

Prothonotary Warbler. 14 August 2022. One juvenile at North Alabama Bend, Clay Co. (5 Class 1P, 2 Class 3). Dissenting committee members noted that the photo submitted along with the report was supportive of Prothonotary Warbler but felt that the photos also showed a small bird, with too much dark on the head, a blue-gray (not olive) back, minimal white on the undertail, and a hint of white or chestnut on the side.

Cerulean Warbler. 18 May 2021. One adult male at Sioux Falls, Lincoln Co. (4 Class 2, 3 Class 3). Dissenting committee members noted that there was no mention of streaking on the flanks or the necklace across the breast and that the details listed were minimal. The report did not conclusively eliminate a hybrid Lazuli X Indigo bunting.

CLASS 4 (Not accepted – Identification probably or certainly incorrect or provenance likely not wild).

No reports were rated as Class 4 in 2022.

OTHER BUSINESS

The committee voted to remove Tundra Swans observed in western South Dakota from the review list. The committee also discussed a formal strategy to deal with eBird or Facebook records for species requiring rare bird reports. The committee decided on the following procedures for such records: (1) ask the reporter for a rare bird report; (2) if no report is received, act on reports with supplementary documentation (e.g., photos, sound recordings), but with up to a 1-year lag period between the report and the committee action; (3) do not act on reports consisting only of descriptions, unless a rare bird report is subsequently submitted.

Annotated list of recent research publications on South Dakota game birds

Ornithologists, including students, academic faculty, and agency staff, have long conducted research on South Dakota's birds. Research results are published in a variety of formats, including theses and dissertations, reports, and publication in scientific journals. This is the first of a series of articles to disseminate some of the recent (2020-2023) published research results to *Bird Notes* readers. This section highlights research on South Dakota's game birds.

To access the original research papers, follow the links or type the name of the article into a search engine such as Google Scholar. Note that some publications are free to download while for others, you must pay for access to the full article.

Assessing predation of artificial nests: Does patch size matter?

This study looked at whether the size or other characteristics of a patch of nesting habitat affects the survival of Ring-necked Pheasant nests. The authors placed artificial nests with domestic chicken eggs in two patch sizes of Conservation Reserve grasslands (small ~8 ha, large ~32 ha) in Beadle and Sanborn counties. They found that nest survival was impacted by factors at both the landscape and local scale. Specifically they found that nest survival increased with 1) an increase in percent grassland within 2 km,

2) greater distance from the edge, 3) an increase in average litter depth at the nest, and 4) higher percent of developed area within 2 km. They conclude that "wildlife managers should continue to manage and advocate for large patches of undisturbed nesting cover to reduce predation risk while establishing additional nesting cover near small patches."

Snow and land use alter pheasant survival in South Dakota

The purpose of this study was to examine the effects of landscape features on female Ring-necked Pheasant winter survival in northeast South Dakota. The authors fitted and tracked more than 300 female pheasants with radio transmitters from 2017-2019. About 66% of the females survived the winter. Female survival decreased with increasing snow depth. Birds not using perennial cover (emergent wetlands, tall or woody vegetation, food plots) had a 2.22 times greater risk of raptor predation. In addition, females in emergent wetlands had a 58% reduced risk of weather mortality. The authors conclude that "pheasants would greatly benefit from conservation of emergent wetlands and integrating perennial cover into harvested cropland."

A Bayesian approach for multiscale modeling of the influence of seasonal and annual habitat variation on relative abundance of ring-necked pheasant roosters

Using SDGFP rooster count data and remote sensing photos, the authors modeled the effects of environmental conditions on rooster abundance over space and time. By simultaneously including both seasonal and annual environmental conditions at local and landscape scales, they obtained a more nuanced view of the effects of these conditions on pheasant abundance. Overall, pheasant abundance was positively affected by intermediate amounts of grassland on the landscape. However the importance of other habitat variables on pheasant abundance varied among years, depending on local weather and climate conditions.

Habitat amount or landscape configuration: Emerging HotSpot analysis reveals the importance of habitat amount for a grassland bird in South Dakota

In this analysis, the authors used 24 years of SDGFP Ring-necked Pheasant brood counts to identify environmental factors associated with variation in pheasant productivity. Using HotSpot analysis, they classified fixed brood routes to identify high (HotSpot) and low (ColdSpot) pheasant production areas. They then looked at habitat differences between the two types of areas. They found that the amount of grassland at a local spatial scale was the primary factor influencing an area being a HotSpot. This result aligns with the habitat amount hypothesis, which states that the amount of particular habitat types in the landscape is important for ring-necked pheasant populations.

Evolutionary origin and genetic diversity of ring-necked pheasants in the Upper Midwest, United States

In this study, the authors compared the DNA of Ring-necked Pheasants in South Dakota and Nebraska to that of Ring-necked Pheasants in their native Eurasian range. The Midwestern pheasants came from two wild lineages – the northern Eurasian lineage and the eastern China lineage. The eastern China lineage is three times more frequent in SD/NE birds but the authors could not distinguish whether this is because the Chinese lineage is released more frequently, survives better, and/or is more easy to harvest. The researchers also found a low level of genetic diversity in Midwestern birds, suggesting an inbreeding effect.

Breeding site fidelity of blue-winged teal in South Dakota

This study calculated the breeding site fidelity of blue-winged teal (*Spatula discors*) in the Prairie Pothole region of South Dakota. From 2003 to 2014, the authors banded 12,543 female blue-winged teal in north-central South Dakota. They then used the live recapture and dead recovery data to estimate probabilities of fidelity, survival, recapture, and reporting. They found that the estimated probability that a female teal returned to her breeding site ranged from 0.20 to 0.91, depending on year and environmental factors. They also estimated overall average probabilities of 0.62 for hatch-year (first-year) teal and 0.67 for after hatch year teal. They conclude that "environmental factors may cause blue-winged teal to return to breeding sites more frequently than previously assumed."

Landowner and biologist perceptions of game bird predators and management

Nest survival is the most important factor causing population change in game birds, and predation, influenced by habitat management, is the primary cause of nest failure of upland game birds. The authors developed a questionnaire to evaluate landowner and natural resource biologist perspectives of different aspects of game bird management in South Dakota. Concerning responses on predator management, the authors found three groups of landowners – those that had strong (37%), moderate (35%) or weak (28%) support of lethal predator control. Landowners with strong or moderate support of lethal predator control rated predators as the primary cause of game bird abundance declines, whereas landowners with weak support of lethal control rated habitat loss as the major factor negatively impacting game birds and disagreed that predators were the primary cause of game bird declines. Biologists' views aligned with the latter group, rating habitat loss as the primary driver of population declines. Thus, when questioned about the effectiveness of different methods to help game bird populations, most landowners focused on predator management while biologists focused on habitat loss and habitat management. The authors hope that the insights gained will help natural resource managers better understand different perspectives and better communicate the reasons for management actions to reverse game bird population declines.



The 2022 Summer Season 01 June 2022 to 31 July 2022

The primary goal of the Summer Season compilation is to report Confirmed Breeding records observed during the season. There were 98 species reported as Confirmed Breeding this year, including 5 first county breeding records. The ten-year (2012-2021) average of Confirmed Breeding species is 115, with a high of 198 in 2012. Secondary objectives of the Summer Season summary include sightings of rare (or at least infrequently reported) species, late spring and early fall migration dates, and species that are reported from unusual locations. Records in bold are either new county records (breeding or otherwise), or new latest spring/earliest fall observations of non-breeding species. There were 238 total species, including 3 rarities (Black-bellied Whistling Duck, Long-tailed Duck, Brown Pelican) reported during the season. The ten-year (2012-2021) average is 253 with a high of 278 in 2012. A full listing of all reported sightings can be obtained from the online database (https://research.dsu.edu/sdousbor/default.aspx). This report contains those sightings and species which are consistent with the objectives of the Summer Season as described above.
