President's Page

While driving around Sioux Falls, I mostly see yards and city parks with mowed grass, manicured shrubs and neatly trimmed trees. Although not entirely poor habitat for some birds, the homogeneous lawns and lack of weeds, brush and dead trees in these urban landscapes are not ideal for most birds. Likewise, when driving around the countryside of southeastern South Dakota, the dominant types of vegetation are fields of corn and soybeans, which provide almost no benefit to birds. Many years ago, in the first part of the last century, homesteaders left some of the land free from the plow, saving some natural areas. They probably did this inadvertently, but these pastures, shelterbelts, meadows and ponds were all part of the small farms of the day. Many birds of this time were able to habituate these natural areas either year-round or as a stopping point during migration, making them increasingly valuable for the birds' survival.

Since then, the countryside landscape has changed from the small farms that had a variety of land uses to the large farms now that predominantly grow row crops. By ripping out trees,



draining wetlands and tilling as much land as possible for crops, people have destroyed a lot of the last remaining habitat for birds. This assault on bird life has been staggering, with 2.9 billion breeding birds lost since 1970 according to the journal Science (Sept 2019). By not having enough regulation and laws in place to preserve wild areas, expanding cities and farms have run roughshod over habitat that is so crucial to birds. In areas where birds can find suitable habitat, cities and farms often spray insecticides on their parks, trails and fields, severely limiting the number of insects available for birds to eat and feed their young. Using insecticide also indiscriminately kills pollinator insects, jeopardizing plants that need these insects for pollination, thereby reducing the production of a plant's berries and fruits that some birds rely on for food.

But not everything is hopeless for birds. There is a push in some cities to change code to allow vegetation other than mowed grass in the boulevards and yards resulting in better habitat. Some cities are going away from the practice of having all mowed grass in their parks by planting native prairie grasses instead. There is a valiant effort by a river restoration group, Friends of the Big Sioux River, to clean up the Big Sioux River that flows through eastern South Dakota. This river flows southerly through agricultural land and cities picking up pollutants, until its confluence with the Missouri River. The Big Sioux's main pollutants are suspended solids from erosion, *E. coli* from animal waste, and nitrates from fertilizers. To attain a cleaner river, farmers, businesses and homeowners must do their part. Homeowners with yards and lawns must minimize or stop using fertilizers, salts and pesticides. Farmers that have fields adjacent to the river need to establish buffer zones of native grasses to mitigate field water run-off and keep their cattle fenced off from wading in the river. There are government land programs for farmers to help offset their potential loss of revenue when implementing these improved land use practices. Farmer participation in these programs, along with everyone doing their part to not contaminate the watershed, is critical for improving the river's health. All these efforts to rehabilitate degraded land and restore rivers are key to start reversing the downward trend of bird populations.

We as bird watchers have a vested interest in seeing birds thrive and we can do more than just feed, watch and checklist birds. The reason these positive changes for rivers and lands are happening is because citizens want to see improved care of the environment and are getting involved to make it happen. Citizens are helping

to make better habitat for birds and wildlife by voting for candidates in local, regional and national public elections who value the importance of the natural environment. Citizens are also joining conservation organizations that are actively involved in improving habitat for wildlife. Attending local government meetings and speaking with, or writing to, officials about issues that will impact wildlife and natural areas is also important. Let the decision makers know the consequences if they do not recognize the value of the natural world. A direct way to help birds is to enhance your yard and gardens by establishing native plants, minimizing mowed lawns and leaving areas of brush and weeds where possible. There is plenty of information readily available from sources on how to do this and the results can make your yard a respite for birds. Trees, birds and animals can't stand up for themselves, so speaking up and acting on their behalf is one way to help protect wildlife and natural areas. Every action by each of us to help the plight of birds can collectively spur positive change for an improved future.

SDOU 2023 Fall Meeting, Vermillion

The 2023 Fall biannual meeting of the South Dakota Ornithologists' Union was held September 29-October 1 on the University of South Dakota campus in Vermillion. Almost 40 attendees enjoyed guest speakers, morning field trips, presentations on current bird research in the state, and the SDOU General Membership and Board of Directors meetings.

Events started Friday evening with a presentation by Jan and Gary Small of Vermillion, who showed photos and told travel stories from a recent birding trip to Columbia. The Smalls have made several birding trips to the country; this recent trip focused on central Columbia and the west border. Birds in these areas include shrub, ranch, and riverine species.

Saturday and Sunday field trips visited local birding spots in the Vermillion and west Sioux Falls area. These included Spirit Mound, Alabama Bend, Wall Lake and Dewey Gevik Natural Area, Lake Vermillion, and Union Grove State Park. Songbird migration was still in full swing and birders reported 110 species for the weekend, including a variety of shorebirds, waterbirds, wrens, sparrows, and warblers. A table at the end of this article lists all of the species; this list is also posted on the SDOU.org website under the Meetings tab.



As is the tradition at the Fall meeting, most of Saturday was devoted to oral presentations by students and other ornithologists on various research topics. Three University of South Dakota professors gave presentations. Dr. Holly Straub, emeritus professor from the Department of Psychology, spoke about the Galapagos Islands and El Nino, while Dr. Andrea Liebl of the Department of Biology presented the results of her research on how invasive House Sparrows are able to spread. Dr. David Swanson of the Department of Biology concluded with his analysis of the range expansion of Eastern Meadowlarks in South Dakota (see also the summer 2023 issue of SD Bird Notes). Two returning graduate students updated the audience on their research. Nadeesha Illepe-



ruma spoke on the impacts of red cedar invasion on riparian birds while Chelsi Marolf presented the latest results of her research on House Sparrow metabolic rates and tissue mass response to fluctuating cold. Emily Macklin, a new graduate student at South Dakota State University, introduced her project on the impacts of land management on Pinyon Jays in Colorado. Reza Goljani-Amirkhiz, a USD alumnus, explained his modelling investigations to predict the influence of climate change and land cover on grassland bird abundance. Finally, educator Kelly Preheim from Armour spoke on the rationale and impacts of her efforts to instill bird and science literacy in her kindergarten students.

After a long day of birding, informative talks, and good food, the Saturday evening banquet speaker was Anna Buckhardt Thomas, an Avian Ecologist from the Iowa Department of Natural Resources. As explained by SDOU president Mark Schmidtbauer in his President's Page (*spring 2023 issue of SD Bird Notes*), there is a proposal to establish a network of Motus Towers for bird tracking in South Dakota. The towers record whenever a bird carrying a Motus tracking device flies by, aiding in our knowledge of bird movements (see motus.org for more details). Ms. Thomas leads the Motus Network for bird tracking in Iowa. The Iowa project currently has 19 towers spread across the state; 16 established by the Iowa DNR and three set up by others. Anna



explained that most of the DNR towers are at county Conservation Districts' parks, allowing for a reasonably good distribution around the state. Although there are no in-state Motus bird tracking projects yet, the Iowa stations are recording the passage of birds from projects around North America. The presentation left the audience even more eager to have a similar network in South Dakota.

At the SDOU General Membership Meeting, members voted for five Board Members who began a new three-year term at the Fall meeting. They are Maggie Figura of Sioux Falls, Ron Mabie of Pickstown, Cheryl Vellenga of Sisseton, Duane Weber of Custer, and Mick Zerr of Sioux Falls. At the Board meeting, board members elected officers for 2024. Mark Schmidtbauer of Brandon will continue to be President, Chris Anderson of Sioux Falls is Vice-president, Bob Bork of Sioux Falls is Treasurer, David Swanson of Vermillion is Secretary and Mick Zerr of Sioux Falls is Librarian.

The next SDOU meeting will be May 28 – June 2, 2024 in Custer.

Annotated List of Recent Research Publications on South Dakota Non-Game Birds

In this article, we highlight recent scientific publications that used, at least in part, data collected on non-game birds in South Dakota. Note that some publications are free to download while for others, you must pay for access to the full article.

Patterns and potential causes of changing winter bird distributions in South Dakota

David L. Swanson, Reza Goljani Amirkhiz, and Mark D. Dixon. The Prairie Naturalist 52 (2020):45-57

The authors used bird records in the SDOU online bird reporting system to evaluate the evidence for a relationship between warmer winters and bird winter distributions. They looked at the 1974 - 2017 winter distributions of three short-distance migrants (Hermit Thrush, Yellow-rumped Warbler, Fox Sparrow) compared to distributions of three vagrants (American Black Duck, Townsend's Solitaire, Varied Thrush). They found that the three short-distance migrants showed marked recent increases in the number of winter records in South Dakota, while for the vagrants, only Townsend's Solitaire has increased. Early winter temperatures correlated positively with increased probability of occurring in South Dakota for Hermit Thrush, Yellow-rumped Warbler, and American Black Duck. According to the authors, these results "suggest that all three study species are expanding their ranges northward in the north-central United States during a period of winter warming, but other factors in addition to winter temperature are also influencing this trend."

Declines of Black-Billed Magpie (*Pica hudsonia*) and Black-Capped Chickadee (*Poecile atricapillus*) in the North-Central United States following the invasion of West Nile Virus

Bird species vary in their susceptibility to West Nile virus (WNV) and the virus can cause regional population declines in very susceptible species. In addition, higher WNV transmission is associated with dry areas with warm winters. The authors used Christmas Bird Count data to investigate changes in winter species abundance before and after the introduction of WNV in the north-central United States. They looked at distributions of two susceptible species, Black-billed Magpie and Black-capped Chickadee and two non-susceptible species, White-breasted Nuthatch and Blue Jay, in four regions (east Great Plains, central Great Plains, Front Range, and Mountain West). Magpie winter abundance was significantly lower in the Great Plains than projected abundances. Chickadee abundances reached their lowest counts ever immediately after the arrival of WNV. Both species have been declining in the Great Plains for over 30 years and WNV is likely a contributing factor. At the same time, abundances of Blue Jays and White-breasted Nuthatches did not show any changes.

Mid-summer arrival by Blue Grosbeaks at the northern extent of their breeding range: evidence for dual breeding?

As previously reported in *South Dakota Bird Notes*, Blue Grosbeaks (*Passerina caerulea*) appear to increase in numbers as the summer progresses in South Dakota (SDBN 71(1):4-5; SDBN 71(2):27-28; SDBN 71(3):47). The authors used three sources of data (SDOU database, eBird observations, 2019-2020 Blue Grosbeak surveys) to further document this observation and explore possible reasons. They found that in eastern and central, but not western, South Dakota, grosbeak numbers peaked in July and more than half of the breeding population arrived after mid-June. Furthermore, grosbeak numbers decreased through the summer in the southern part of their breeding range (Texas and Oklahoma). Possibly, failed early breeders move north to renest. Alternatively, Blue Grosbeaks in central North America may have a dual breeding strategy, raising a first brood in the south and a second brood in the north. If the latter is true, this would be the first documentation of a south-then-north dual breeding pattern in North America.

Avian community response to Eastern Red Cedar (*Juniperus virginiana*) encroachment in eastern South Dakota

In the Northern Great Plains, Eastern Red Cedar (ERC) (Juniperus virginiana L.) is a rapidly spreading invasive woody species that has altered landscapes and habitats. In particular, ERC encroachment converts grassland into woodland, which may negatively impact grassland-reliant bird species. In this study, the authors documented the avian community in encroached and non-encroached grasslands in South Dakota. They conducted point count bird surveys in July 2021 at six ERC-encroached grassland sites and six non-encroached grassland sites in eastern South Dakota. Overall, they recorded 47 species, 32 in non-encroached sites and 42 in encroached sites. Non-encroached sites were dominated by grassland-reliant species such as Sedge Wren (Cistothorus platensis), Bobolink (Dolichonyx oryzivorus), Western Meadowlark (Sturnella neglecta), and Dickcissel (Spiza americana), while encroached sites were dominated by woodland/shrub species such as Clay-colored Sparrow (Spizella pallida), American Goldfinch (Spinus tristis), Eastern Kingbird (Tyrannus tyrannus), and Brown-headed Cowbird (Molothrus ater). These results show that ERC encroachment impacts avian grassland community composition, amplifying the importance of active management to slow or prevent the spread of ERC.

Vegetation associations of riparian birds in successional woodlands along the regulated Missouri River

Riverine habitat and vegetation has changed drastically as a result of 60 years of water regulation by dams on the upper Missouri River, with decreases in early and increases in older forest communities, and higher occurrence of invasive upland tree species. This study explores the influence of riverine forest successional stage, species composition, and forest structure on breeding bird biodiversity along the Missouri River in eastern South Dakota and Nebraska. The researchers conducted breeding bird surveys and recorded a variety of habitat measurements in 2009 and 2010 along two stretches of unchanneled river between the Fort Thompson dam and Ponca, Nebraska. They identified 11 bird species that had highest abundances in early successional habitats (young cottonwood-willow, Russian Olive) and 19 bird species with highest abundances in older forests (mid- to late-aged cottonwood and non-cottonwood forests). Notably, early successional bird species were equally abundant in native cottonwood-willow stands as in non-native Russian Olive stands, suggesting that management efforts to remove Russian Olive may impact this group of birds. Some forest species, such as Baltimore Oriole, showed a preference for cottonwood and an avoidance of Red Cedar, while other forest species did not. The authors note that "these data suggest that the trends in riparian forest change due to river regulation along the middle Missouri River may produce a mix of positive and negative effects on riparian bird species." Finally, in comparing the results of this study with those of similar studies in other parts of the western U.S., the authors found differences among studies, suggesting that "the relationship between bird species richness and vegetation succession in riparian habitats is difficult to generalize and may be dependent on the specific riparian systems and bird communities involved. Such a conclusion complicates management of riparian systems for bird species richness and diversity and highlights the need for local information in developing specific management plans."

Arthropod prey and diets of woodland migrants are similar between natural riparian woodlands and anthropogenic woodlots in the northern prairie region

Ming Lui's doctoral research at University of South Dakota focused on the relative quality of natural riparian woodland corridors and planted shelterbelts as stopover sites for spring and fall migrant songbirds in southeast South Dakota. In this part of his research, Ming compared insect prey abundance and insect-eating migrant songbird diets in the two habitat types. He found no consistent differences in insect numbers or biomass between corridors and shelterbelts in three years of sampling. Analysis of bird fecal samples showed that migrant songbird diets in both habitats mainly consisted of beetles (Coleoptera), flies (Diptera), and true bugs (Hemiptera) in the fall, and bees and wasps (Hymenoptera), beetles, and flies in the spring. He concludes that "these data collectively suggest that arthropods were present in sufficient abundance and diversity at both corridors and woodlots for migrant birds to successfully refuel at these riparian stopover sites."

Investigating niches and distribution of a rare species in a hierarchical framework: Virginia's Warbler (*Leiothlypis virginiae*) at its northeastern range limit

Understanding the habitat needs and limitations of rare species is often complicated by a paucity of field observations upon which to base analyses. The authors tested a statistical approach to solve this dilemma using data from occurrence records of Virginia's Warbler in the Black Hills. They looked at the suitability of habitat at multiple scales (the hierarchical framework), defining suitable habitat at the broadest scale as a function of bioclimatic variables and at finer scales as functions of landcover, soil group and landscape variables. They found that at the broadest scale, Black Hills Virginia's Warblers occur in a narrow range of climatic conditions. At finer (smaller) scales, different variables were important, depending on the scale. The researchers conclude that this approach "can lead to detailed information about rare species' niches, limiting factors at each habitat selection order, and potential distribution, which could help inform multiscale management."

Comprehensive estimation of spatial and temporal migratory connectivity across the annual cycle to direct conservation efforts

Threats to migratory birds are often well-studied on their breeding grounds, but much less is known about what threats occur during other parts of the year. This research examined the migration phase of the annual cycle of the Common Nighthawk (*Chordeiles minor*), a widespread, declining, long-distance migrant. This species is doing well in some parts of its breeding range but has experienced sharp population declines in other areas, leading to the question of whether the birds are being negatively impacted on the breeding grounds,

wintering grounds, or migration. The researchers attached GPS tags to 52 birds from 12 breeding populations, including six birds from eastern South Dakota, and tracked their migration. South Dakota nighthawks fly southeast towards the Gulf Coast of Florida in the fall, then join other Common Nighthawks to fly south across the Gulf of Mexico and a narrow corridor through the Colombian Andes, and then into central Brazil. The birds retrace their steps to return in the spring. Common Nighthawks from different breeding populations tend to migrate separately while migrating through North America (high migratory connectivity) but start to mix while in Central and South America (low migratory connectivity) because of a common migratory route and similar migration timing across populations. These results suggest that factors negatively affecting some breeding populations are occurring in North America, not in Central or South America. The authors also note that the analyses used in this study "can be used to focus migratory bird conservation towards places and times of the annual cycle where populations are more likely to be limited."

Urban rooftop-nesting Common Nighthawk chicks tolerate high temperatures by hyperthermia with relatively low rates of evaporative water loss

Common Nighthawks (*Chordeiles minor*) in the Midwest largely nest on urban rooftops. As part of her PhD research, Gretchen looked at the thermal tolerances of nighthawk chicks to evaluate the possible impact of predicted climate change (higher temperatures and humidity) on rooftop-nesting birds. In the lab she exposed 7- to 14-day-old nighthawk chicks to conditions simulating their rooftop thermal environment and measured rates of oxygen consumption, evaporative water loss (EWL) and body temperature. Chicks survived ambient temperatures up to 51°C and body temperatures up to 48°C; EWL resulted in body mass loss. Chicks were hyperthermic under heat exposure, suggesting that increases in body temperature helped reduce EWL. She concludes that, given the high rates of mass loss and high body temperatures at hot ambient temperatures, chick heat tolerance mechanisms could be detrimental under projected climate change, which could precipitate a decline in urban nighthawk populations.

Metabolic profiling and integration of metabolomic and transcriptomic data from pectoralis muscle reveal winter-adaptive metabolic responses of black-capped chickadee and American goldfinch

Resident birds in South Dakota face challenges of extremes in weather, especially temperatures, and food availability among seasons throughout the year. To survive, small birds adjust their metabolism to the changing conditions. To better understand how birds do this, the authors studied the chemical profiles of pectoralis (flight) muscles of Black-capped Chickadees (*Poecile atricapillus*) and American Goldfinches (*Spinus tristis*) in summer and winter. Chickadees showed a greater difference in summer versus winter metabolite enzyme (chemical) profiles than did goldfinches. In winter, both species had reduced levels of amino acids (proteins), possibly because of a lack of insect prey. Both species also showed a potential for faster breakdown of nutrients in winter to generate the energy to keep warm. Chickadees in particular shifted to a greater breakdown of lipids in winter, presumably to create energy. The researchers then looked at the genes that regulate and are regulated by metabolite enzymes. They found that gene-metabolite pairs that were related to the winter-adaptive metabolic response were overrepresented in winter flight muscles. The researchers conclude that collectively, their results suggest "a potential novel mechanism for increasing winter metabolic output, fueled by lipids" for small birds to keep warm during winter.



The 2023 Spring Season

There were 297 species, including 4 rarities (Eurasian Wigeon, Ruddy Turnstone West River, Western Sandpiper, and Red-naped Sapsucker in the Missouri River Corridor) and 11 first county records reported to the SDOU online database during the season. The ten-year (2013-2022) average is 318. Below, I have tried to highlight the more significant sightings (early/late dates as given in the online database or first county records, indicated in bold; species that are significantly out of range; or confirmed breeding for species that breed early). For early/late migration dates, I have listed the three earliest/latest dates (by county). However, if these did not include a sighting East River, West River, and along the Missouri River, I have included the earliest/latest reported date from the missing region also. Included at the end of this report is a list of species that were not reported this year but might be expected during the Spring Season. A species is placed on the list if it was not reported this year but had been reported during spring in at least 2 of the previous 5 years. Numbers in parentheses indicate the number of consecutive years (up to 4) that the species has appeared on the list during the season.
